Toronto, Jan. 6 .- Three little children were frozen to death at Yellow Grass, near Regina, while going from their home to visit their grand parents, two miles distant.

Four Firemen Buried.

Milwaukee, Wis., Jan. 3 .- Fire in the Milwaukee plant of the America Bridge Company to-night caused t death of four firemen who were buried under a falling wall, and \$250,000 damage. The firemen killed were Capt. John Hennessey, Lt. Dominick O'Donnell and two truckmen. Several others were injured and several suffered frost bites while fighting the flames. The engine company, who suffered all the casualties, took its station under the main wing of the factory, a long two-story brick structure. The wall fell on the men and it was at first thought that all the members of the company met death, but several were saved by a pocket in the
