The Mineral Scandal!

The Scandalous Prospectus of 1911 Not Denied.

Both the *Telegram* and the *Advocate* have charged that the names of D. Morison, M. P. Cashin, C. H. Emerson and F. J. Morris, were named as Counsel and Directors on a *Mineral Prospectus* exploiting Bay de Verde Iron Ore in a most shameful, fraudulent manner by representing that there were actually 200,000 tons of ore ready for shipment out of forty million tons (estimated) in the property. That prospectus was published in 1911 with the names of Morison and his gang on it as Directors. That prospectus stated in 1911 that Morison and his gang were having active participation in the affairs of that fraudulent scheme.

Morison and his gang have not denied it. Sir Edward Morris has not denied it. The *Daily News* has not denied it. Even the *Herald* has not denied it. Therefore we take it that they do not intend to deny it. Therefore we infer these men had shares or agreements for shares in the shameful brazen scheme, as people cannot be Directors without holding shares, and therefore we ask if we are wrong in thinking that their silence meant that they stood to profit from the fruits of that brazen attempt to swindle.

Now the *Daily News* Editor, with brazen effrontery, stiffened by the moral teachings of his Sunday exhortations, publishes the first page of a prospectus of a genuine company which was floated in 1898 and which spent half a million dollars on the property in Bay de Verde. That money was spent on the recommendation of an eminent English Mining Engineer who had great hopes of the property, and who was in charge of the works. That engineer had a reputation for honesty and ability. He believed there was a large quantity of iron ore there. When he found only a few hundred tons of ore in the property, when he found that the deposit had suddenly cut out, the disappointment, the chagrin so worked on his mind that he took to drinking and died a broken hearted man.

The *Daily News* Editor now wants to say that because Sir Robert Bond was connected with that company—and of which he has himself spoken as an example of the uncertainty of mining in any country, therefore the *News* says he is as bad as Morison and his gang. Note this in passing.

Not Got On Its

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—There is a good anxiety about here as to who is to represent the Southern ranks of the Bond Party, after election. Have no two picked in and Moore this time? What put it into people's heads that the old Liberal District has gone by its old time honored principles of liberalism. I admit with some personal shame that we blundered years ago, but our eyes have been opened and we admit we have been deceived by the Morris and false promises, and that we silly craze all Newfoundlanders for a change. It is good that should blunder, so that they may learn their shortsightedness and avoid great errors before it is late. They are generally led by the prospect of what they are going to get out of it and not their selfishness, due to their ignorance and narrow vision. They lose sight of larger issues, take little stock in men or things, their own narrow circle and their Private Interests and the interests of their friends.

Narrow-mindedness, ignorance, and those qualities of degeneracy blunted the finer feelings and led many to that sense of honesty, justice and patriotism that shows in the conduct of men of moulds. Self first, friends second, country last, is the order in which our concerns are directed; how that politicians, knowing our weakness, always, of late years, appeal to our lower instincts, and away by promises that excite our selfishness, and keep us blind to the danger that in so doing they are making tools of us for their own advancement, our own disappointment and our country's ruin. The last election was proof of what I say, and last four years' work of the Morris Party a stern eye-opener to the fact that a majority of the people are badly duped and the country's interests rushed to the brink of ruin. I go so far as to say that at last even many of us made fools of ourselves, and if asked then or since what we expected, except in a few cases where fellows were promised jobs, we could not point to one object for our country's benefit we could hope to gain.

We seem to have been blinded not only to the fact that the Morris Party was a tool, but that we were employing ourselves in the eyes, not of those whose esteem we should have valued, but that we by our conduct were sacrificing our reputation.
