The U-29.

The German submarine blockade has been on for almost a month and no large or fast steamers have been sunk. But a number of small and slow steamers have succumbed to the torpedoes of the submarine. On Thursday morning a new steamer of 2,386 tons was sunk in the British Channel. On Friday the Indian City, Headlands and Andalusian were sunk between the British Channel and the Scilly Islands. These steamers are all much about the same tonnage, comparatively small and slow. Apparently no lives were lost and two of the steamers may be saved. The damage was done by the U. 29. This submarine is one of six vessels added recently to the German navy. They have 900 tons displacement when submerged. On the surface they are run with heavy-oil engines which generate 2,000 horse-power, and when submerged they run by electric motors of 900 h.p. This surface speed is 18 knots, and the submerged speed 10 knots. They carry enough fuel to steam 4,000 miles on the surface. They are armed with two bow and two stern torpedo tubes, with eight large torpedoes. They also carry two 14 pdr. Quick-firing guns, and two 1 pdr. high-angle gun to protect themselves against aircraft. "They have wireless telegraphic apparatus on board, and are specially constructed with long super-

Latest Sealing News.

The Postal Telegraphs received the following message this morning:—"Four steel ships 10 miles off Easton making no progress; also Bloodhound and Eagle passed north yesterday." The Marine and Fisheries Department received the following to-day:—"Bonavista.—"Much water to be seen in Bay yesterday. Lighthouse Keeper reported Eagle jammed 4 miles E.S. E. of Cape yesterday; no report since." Seal Cove.—"Bay still jammed with ice; no seals." Change Islands.—"Ice on land, seven old hoods killed here Saturday." La Seie.—"Seals 3 miles E. by N. of Cape; none got." Catalina.—"Heavy close packed ice, 5 steamers about 8 miles E. by S. of Green Island." Twillingate.—"Bay full of ice; several old hoods killed Saturday." Port aux Basques.—"Wind N. E., no ice in sight; Viking arrived at 10 last night, sailed at 7 to-day."

IRONCLAD BLOCKADE.

PARIS, To-day. An ironclad blockade of German forts has been agreed upon by England and France, according to information secured from reliable sources this afternoon. It is understood that a proclamation of the blockade will be issued here and in London on Monday evening.

REDMOND ON THE UNITED EMPIRE.

MANCHESTER, To-day. John Redmond in a speech to 5,000 persons here to-day pointed out that he had often addressed meetings of Irishmen in Manchester but never before an assemblage of Irishmen and Englishmen firmly united in common purpose. Ireland had been admitted to her proper place in the British Empire with which she had as much to do in building up as England, Redmond continued. She has already taken her proper place with profit and absolute good faith and loyalty; ten years ago the Kaiser might have found a divided Empire, he said, but he had forgotten the march of events. The rule of the people has been substituted for a rule of the classes and the Empire is united on a sure foundation of liberty. In fighting for the Empire Irishmen are fighting for Ireland.

THE U-29.

LONDON, To-day. The German submarine U-29, one of the largest and fastest German under-craft, had a successful three days off Scilly Isles and the English Channel, where on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, she succeeded in sinking four British steamers, one French steamer and damaging three others. The German commander gave the crews of most of the steamers time to leave the vessels. The submarine U-29 was chased by patrol boats but proved too elusive for them while steamers which tried to ram or escape her found that the submarine was much faster than similar craft which had previously been sent on the mission to destroy Britain's overseas trade. With German submarines in the waters around the Scilly Isles through which big liners pass on their way across the Atlantic, there is much uneasiness in shipping circles. During the course of the day, a report which also reached the American liner New York by wireless, was circulated to the effect that one had been torpedoed. The report, it is believed, arose from the sinking of the Andalusian which belongs to the Ellerman Line.

FRENCH SUCCESSES.

PARIS, To-day. Official advices from the front describing the occupation of Vauquois, in the Argonne region, by the French, say that after several days desperate fighting, the French troops took possession of the Plateau. Half of the village of Vauquois on the eastern outskirts of Argonne have been able to prevent the Germans from making use of this important strategic position to their own advantage. Vauquois lies in high country not far from Trecheppy and Mont Faubon on a height overlooking Aire River between Hesse and Argonne forests. This place served the Germans as a post of observation.

ALLIES AIR SERVICE OUTCLASSES GERMANS.

LONDON, To-day. The Daily Express correspondent on the Belgian frontier telegraphs: "The sudden offensive of the Allies from

Champagne to the sea, resulting in gains at many points, seems to have taken the Germans wholly by surprise. A convincing indication of the partial or temporary demoralization of the troops which bore the brunt of these five days of successive onslaughts is the arrival at Ghent and Brussels for trial by court martial of parties of soldiers sent under escort from trenches for having failed to respond to the order to make counter-attacks with sufficient enthusiasm. In some cases it is said they even failed to advance at all. Great havoc was caused by the accurate fire of the British artillery, which apparently was the prime factor in the paralyzation of the Germans. All accounts of the week's fighting filtering through the frontier from German sources, chiefly from the wounded, lay stress on the terrible accuracy of the British shell, which made some of the positions wholly untenable. The correspondent of the Daily Mail telegraphs from Rotterdam that the British success at Neuve Chapelle was due largely to the wonderful work of the Allied aeroplanes. Not a German gun was laid, not a troop of troops moved without being detected by the eyes of the British army. German officers in Bruges admit that their air service is hopelessly outclassed in numbers, daring and intelligence by the Allies.

INDIA'S CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE WAR.

London, March 6.—A special dispatch from Delhi, India, indicates that enthusiasm for the successful outcome of the war continues unabated. The Indian relief fund now reaches the total of \$5,000,000. The largest sum previously raised in India was \$1,263,000, contributed in 1900 for relief of the acute famine that year. The chiefs and noblemen of India continue to present valuable gifts of every description for the prosecution of the war. Last month's donations include \$8,100 annually from the Maharaja Datta and his Sirdars; from another native potentate, \$8,100; from the Nizam of Hyderabad, a hospital of fifty beds. Motor ambulances are given by another; while from others there are contributions of large quantities of hay and blankets. One loyal raja announces that he will pay his soldiers from the revenues of his estates.

GERMANS AND TURKS CLASH; 300 KILLED.

London, March 8.—Telegraphing from Cairo the Daily Mail's correspondent says: "During the retreat of the Turks after the recent Suez operations the German officers had an open conflict with their allies, and three hundred of the latter were killed in a single affray near Jerusalem."
