QUEEN-MOTHER ILL.

LONDON, May 17. The condition of Dowager Queen Alexandra, who is suffering from bronchial cold, is causing anxiety, says the Star to-day. The newspaper cites the fact that Queen Alexandra s now seventy-five years of age, and declares that such a cold - must be considered a serious matter to a person of her age.

BOLSHEVIKS ENTERING PERSIA.

It is announced that the Bolsheviki have appeared at Astara, and crossed the Persian frontier, says a despatch to the London Times from Teheran, under date of May 11. The despatch adds that the Bolsheviki said they had no quarrel with Persia but that British troops must be withdrawn. Astara is a small town in the southeast corner of Transcaucasia on the Caspian Sea.

#### WAR CHIEFS HONORED.

LONDON, May 17. With full civil ceremonial, Admiral Jellicoe and Viscount French today received Swords of Honor and Freedom of the City of London. The Duke of Connaught and Marshal Haig attended. Admiral Jellicoe, returning thanks, paid a great tribute to the Dominion's naval air services. Their splendid gallantry, sacrifice and endurance has made the British mercantile marine famous throughout history, he said. Lord French, replying, said when he went to France he hoped to remain until "we had won the victory," which he never doubted would be "ours." "It is too early to pronounce a verdict on the great factors and characters of the war, but our deeds will be judged calmly and faithfully at the bar of history. To that great tribunal I am only too willing to leave the duty of assessing our merits and demerits. The great lesson is, that indecision and vaciliation always end in disaster." Lord French added that the Germans made a cardinal mistake in failing to seize the Channel ports

#### which might have prolonged the war. NOT ALL SUNSHINE.

LONDON, May 17. Canadians who preferred to accept commissions in the Imperial forces on the conclusion of hostilities, are laboring under a distinct sense of grievance in connection with leave to their homes in Canada. They must now pay full ordinary fares both ways, whereas English officers are brought home free.

WASHINGTON, May 17. The Superior National Forest, in Minnesota, is threatened with destruc tion by forest fires, the United States Forestry Service was informed by telegrams received to-night.

POLES TOO MANY FOR BOLSHIES.

COBLENZ, May 17. Authentic information received by the American command from Warsaw. shows that the Poles are concentrating on a front south of Kiev. in Podolia, and are pointing in the direction of Odessa. Leon Trotsky, Russian Bolsheviki War Minister, has called upon all Russians to rise against Poland. New Bolshevik forces, including the Bashkir Brigade, are attacking Kiev and the casualties are reported to be fairly heavy. Other Bolshevik reinforcements are arrivng between the Dnieper and the Dneiser. Between April 25th and May 10th, the Poles took 30,000 prisoners and 150 guns, and 5 machine guns, exclusive of material found in depots. The Polish losses, to May 10th, are reported to have been only a hundred killed and three wounded but the losses to troops holding Kiev

Law added that ; Great Britain had sold Poland some surplus stores last October, and that it would have been a breach of faith on the part of Great Britain if the desnatch of ammunition had been prevented. He declared that no assistance, financial or otherwise was given Poland.

#### THREW DOWN TOOLS.

HAVRE, May 17. The engine room and stoke hold nands on board the French Liner France, quit work and left the vessel to-day, therefore the France will not sail for New York to-morrow. The strikers demanded more pay.

#### MARTIAL LAW FOR DERRY.

LONDON, May 17. A large force of troops arrived Monday in Londonderry, says a despatch to the Daily Mail. The disturbed areas of the city are well controlled. The despatch adds that the magistrates have decided to proclain state of martial law.

#### A CLOSE SHAVE.

OTTAWA, May 17.

The House divided at midnight on Hon. W. S. Fielding's resolution. calling on the Government to submit the matter to Parliament, before proceeding with the appointment of a Canadian Ambassador at Washington. The amendment was defeated by a majority of five, the vote being 63 for the amendment, and 68 against.

#### NITTI RECALLED.

ROME, May 17. Signor Nitti, whose cabinet resigned last week, has accepted an invitation by King Victor Emmanuel to form a new ministry. The invitation was extended to-day after the King had conversed with former Premiers Tittoni and Orlando.

#### SITUATION FACING DE-

PUTIES. PARIS, May 17. The French Chamber of Deputies, when it convenes to-morrow, after a holiday of three weeks, will face situation fraught with the greatest internal difficulties. The Deputies first will have to decide whether the Government's projected law for the improvement of the railroad service must be considered to the exclusion of the nationalization plan of the General Federation of Labor. Discussion of the ratification of a stronger main treaty with Austria will be postponed at the request of the government, which desires to liquidate the Internal situation immediately, before taking up foreign political matters.
