The Labrador Boundary.

It is stated that the Labrador is found to be rich in forests, minerals, and other resources, and an endeavor is being made to settle the boundary between the province of Newfoundland and Labrador.

The Royal Instructions to Newfoundland governors describe their jurisdiction as: "All the lands of Labrador, from the entrance of Hudson's Straits to a line to be drawn due north and south from Anse-au-Loup on the east coast to the fifty-degree degree of north latitude." The Canadian contention is that Newfoundland has merely a narrow strip of land along the coast, ending Cape Chidley, which they hold to be the entrance to Hudson's Straits. The Hudson's Straits is confined to the immediate entrance of Hudson's Bay and lies between Cape Charles and other adjacent islands of the northern Labrador shore, and what Quebec holds to be Hudson's Straits really "Frobisher's Straits" and is so called on all the old maps. Pictou Man Murdered.

DANIEL BARRY WAS SHOT AND HIS COUCH WAS SET ON FIRE —\$400 MISSING.

Daniel Barry, a highly-respected citizen of Pictou, who was found dead in his burning house on Thursday evening, Dec. 13, was robbed and murdered, according to the verdict of the coroner's jury.

The murderer or murderers are unknown. Mr. Barry lived alone. On Thursday he had not been noticed around and neighbors calling in the evening became suspicious that something was wrong. The house being entered, it was found that Mr. Barry was lying on a burning sofa, having all the appearance of having been set by sparks from his pipe.

The examination of the body showed that Mr. Barry had died by a bullet wound and not suffocation as at first supposed, and that the bullet wound could not have been self-inflicted.

Two gold watches and \$400 which the deceased was known to have had could not be found.—Acadian Recorder.

WILL LECTURE TO HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

Toronto, Dec. 31.—Dr. Thomas J. Glover, of this city who has discovered a serum for the treatment of cancer, which is being investigated by a special committee of the Toronto Academy of Medicine with a view to a public report thereon, is said to have received flattering offers to go to the United States to follow up his work in relieving cancer patients.

The Toronto Star Weekly states that a New York man has offered Dr. Glover \$1,000,000 in cash for his secret prescription and permission to market it on the commercial market.

Chicago multimillionaire, according to the paper, who has been afflicted with cancer and has obtained relief from Dr. Glover's treatment, has offered to equip and finance a cancer clinic in Chicago if Dr. Glover will go there and manage it.

It is stated that, notwithstanding these and other offers, Dr. Glover intends to remain in Toronto and follow up his researches in cancer serums.

The Growling Fish.

A fish that growls and meows like a cat is found in certain parts of South America, Africa, and Australia, and this is respected by scientists to be in many respects the most wonderful fish in the world. It looks much more like a snake than a fish. It has lungs and is obliged to put its head out of water frequently to breathe. Lung fish, as these creatures are called, are a link between reptiles and fishes—the nearest kind to the original stock from which snakes and fish both sprang, and in the fossil period these ancestors of theirs were scattered over the entire world. One reason these strange fish have been preserved thousands and thousands of years after their pre-historic ancestors were extinct is because they can live easily through long droughts. Alligators and their African cousins, the crocodiles, are almost the only enemies they have to fear except man.

In the natural state, the African lung fish is about 18 inches long, but when kept in aquariums and fed the year round, instead of lying dormant for lack of water, they grow to be two feet and a half long and weigh six pounds or more.

The anterior fins of the malha are quite small and are not able to get on the water. They are in reality thin paws which are of no service in swimming.
