The Man Who Painted Africa Red

One day some years ago a sumptuous seven-year-old boy stepped ashore at Furbas, in South Africa from a sailing ship that had been seventy days to make the voyage. The doctors had given him six months to live. But for once the doctors were wrong. The dry, burning climate worked wonders with the young man, so that he developed into a big, broad-shouldered, hefty man.

Cecil Rhodes was the name of the new-comer, and at first his career offered little from that of scores of other young Englishmen of good family who had come out there to try their fortune in the newer land.

He started cotton-planting, and failed. Then came the discovery of diamonds, and Rhodes joined in the rush with hundreds of other diggers. He made money and prospered exceedingly, buying up mines after mines.

A Bucketful of Diamonds.

His only serious rival was one Barnett Isaacs, the son of a Jewish shopkeeper in Whitechapel, who had come to Kimberley from England with sixty years' savings. These he sold at an enormous profit, invested the proceeds in mining claims, changed his name to Barney Barnato and was a millionaire almost before he realized it.

So, too, was Cecil Rhodes, and the two men engaged in a dog-fight battle—the prize, the virtual control of the whole diamond-mining industry in South Africa. Eventually, each realizing that neither could get the better of the other, they joined forces.

Afterwards Rhodes, at Barnato's request, took him to lunch at the Kimberley Club, into which he had never previously been able to secure admission. Then, turning to his guest, he said: "Well, Barney you've had your win; now I should like to have mine. It is one which you alone in Kimberley can satisfy. I want to see a whole bucketful of diamonds."

His One Great Dream.

Much flattered, Barnato—Basil Williams tells us in his newly-published life of Rhodes—shovelled all his available diamonds into a basket, into which Rhodes plunged his two arms. Lifted out hundreds of the glittering gems, and luxuriously let them stream back through his fingers like water.

The action is typical of the man. Diamonds represented wealth, and Rhodes was greedy for wealth because wealth meant power—power to achieve great things. He was dreaming even then of his pet project, "painting the map of Africa red."

Six years sufficed for Rhodes to make his dream a reality. In that brief space of time he accomplished more than had been done during the centuries that had preceded his advent on the scene.

And it was no mere painting of the map. More than 750,000 square miles were added to the British Empire, a territory larger than Spain, France and the former German Empire put together.

His Warning to a Savage Chief.

In order to achieve his end, he allowed nothing to stand in his way. A good example of his method of dealing with the native races is afforded by his treatment of Sigean, the paramount chief of Pondoland.

This truculent savage had treated the British High Commissioner, Sir Henry Loch, with studied insolence, keeping him waiting for three days before granting him an interview. Directly Rhodes heard of it he went into Pondoland, although warned of the risk, and summoned Sigean to his presence.

Then he kept him waiting three days in his turn, and afterwards took him for a walk towards a mesquite field, on which some machine-guns had been trained. At a given signal the guns opened fire and laid low the mesquite crop.

"That is what will happen to you and your tribe," grimly remarked Rhodes, "if you give any further trouble. You are unfit to govern. Your country is annexed." And so he said, so it was.—Pearson's Weekly.
