P. le VIII. (Weights).—Contestants will weigh in on the day of their first bout; time to be arranged by the weighers. The weight registered at the original weighing-in will be the competitor's official weight for the entire competition.

Competitions in all championships will be held in the following weights and classes:

Weight and Classes:-Bantam Weight, 118 lbs.; Featherweight, 125 lbs.; Lightweight, 135 lbs.; Welter. weight, 147 lbs.; Middleweight, 160 lbs.; Heavyweight,

A competitor may enter only the class of his own weight unless he is the only entry in that class when he may be allowed to enter in the class next heavier. Any competitor entering for any weight and failing to make that weight at the required time may enter the next heavier class or be scratched from the list.
