The Trail of the Guarantee.

If the total sum of losses incurred by the present Government since their advent to power in November, 1919, were added up the amount would be astonishing. And it is not at all surprising that the balance always came on the wrong side of the account, when the qualifications of Government members as business men are considered.

And thus it has been discovered by a well placed question in the House of Assembly that the revenue is out the huge sum of four hundred and ten thousand, seven hundred and fourteen dollars, eleven cents (\$410,714.11) on the Government's guarantee for outfitting certain of the fishermen on last year's account.

INSIDE INFORMATION.

NEW YORK, March 28. The High Commission of the Irish Provisional Government, last night, made the public statement that Premier Lloyd George in December, 1920, sent to Michael Collins "an offer of truce," on similar terms to that concluded in July, 1921, and that it was on the point of conclusion when Rev. Michael O'Flanagan, then acting head of the Sinn Fein organization "queered the pitch" by sending an authorized telegram to the British Premier that Ireland wanted peace.
