GENERAL MOTORS REGULAR DI-VIDENDS. First Quarter Net at Annual Rate \$3.40 a Share on Common.

NEW YORK, April 23.-General Motors declared regular quarterly dividends 30 cents on common. \$1.50 each on preferred and 60 per cent debenture and \$1.75 on 7 per cent debenture. Common dividend is payable June 12 to stock of record May 19, other dividends August 1, to stock of record July 7.

President Sloan announced final figures for first quarter will not be available until later in week, but preliminary figures indicate net earnings available for dividends after deciation reserve and tax reserve is \$19,280,000, which compares with \$19,406,000 a year ago.

After deducting preferred dividends this is equal to 85 cents a share on common stock, or at a rate of \$3.40 per annum, but does not include Fisher Body earnings in excess of dividends paid.

The corporation sold, 212,572 carsand trucks, against 176,258 cars and trucks in the first quarter of 1923.
