TWO ROUNDS ENOUGH!

What Bombardier Wells Did To Charlie Penwill.

Bombardier Wells, former British heavyweight champion, and considered one of the most scientific boxers who ever stepped into a ring, made a successful re-appearance at Hoxton Baths, when he knocked out Charlie Penwill in the second round. Wells from the start made his opponent look like a novice as he sent home left after left to the jaw. Penwill had doubtless heard that Wells's weak point was the body, and he aimed for it, but he took only punishment for his pains, because he could not get past the piston-like left which met his jaw every second or so. The first round showed the Wells of old, with an even more formidable left, but with his great, but attractive, falling, that he would not go in to finish matters with both hands. The ex-champion went the first round without receiving a blow that would have hurt a light-weight, while Penwill was showing signs of punishment he had received about the mouth. Penwill made a great error in attempting to mix matters early in the second round, for Wells sent in left after left to keep his opponent at a distance, and then, like a flash, he sent home a stinging right to the body. Penwill crumpled up and went down. He was glad of the rest, and stayed down for a count of nine. It needed only one real blow to settle matters now, and Wells sent it on his mission. A left fell from the shoulder, and then a mere clip with the right, threw Penwill off his balance. Wells stepped back with his guard dropped, and at the end of the count Penwill was still painfully struggling to his feet. Wells never fought better, even at his best, and on many bigger occasions nothing like so well.

BOXING.

SAYS IT WAS A GIFT.

The Montreal Star's Boston correspondent says:

Referee Joe O'Connor handed Romero Rojas his Christmas gift in the form of a decision over Jack Renault in their ten round bout in Mechanics' Hall recently. Renault, after winning nine out of the ten rounds by a comfortable lead in every one but the fourth, in which Rojas had a slight shade, was adjudged a loser in one of the weirdest decisions ever rendered in a Boston ring.

There was nothing wrong with the fight until Referee O'Connor, for some unaccountable reason, began to antagonize Renault. The latter fought the best he knew how, and while it was hardly of a championship calibre, was by far better than what Rojas presented. Why the referee antagonized Renault is a mystery. He continually kept urging him to fight when the latter nearly pounded the stomach out of Rojas. It was Renault who registered cleanly throughout, inviting swapping feasts and almost outwitted himself trying to appease the desire of the referee to commit a slaughter. The entire blame for the verdict cannot be laid directly to the referee, as one of the judges must also have decided in favor of Rojas.

ERNIE IZZARD ACCLAIMED LIGHT WEIGHT CHAMPION OF ENGLAND.

LONDON, Nov. 25.—In a twenty round bout for the lightweight championship of Great Britain and the Lonsdale belt, at the National Sporting Club here last night, Ernie Izzard, of Harn Hill, outpointed Jack Kirk, of Doncaster. The bout was closely contested and a rally staged by Izzard toward the finish earned him the award. Izzard had the advantage in height and reach, and scored with left leads to the head, but he made little use of the right hand except with blows to the ribs when in the clinches. Kirk showed a sound defence and landed several stinging uppercuts with left and right hooks to the face. The first four rounds were fairly even, but the next three Kirk was clearly out in front. At the half way stage Izzard showed marked improvement and landed repeatedly with heavy lefts to his opponent's jaw. He gradually wore Kirk down till the last two rounds, when they battled fiercely, with Izzard having the better of the exchanges and doing the most damage.

JEFF SMITH WAS BADLY BEATEN. Gene Tunney Forced the Bayonne Boxer to the Canvas.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Dec. 8.—Gene Tunney, of New York, American light heavyweight champion, had all the better of his 15 round no decision match here with Jeff Smith, of Bayonne, N.J. For the first time in his career extending over fourteen years of fighting in nearly every country on the globe, Smith was knocked down when he sank to the canvas in the twelfth round before wicked left punches to the ribs.

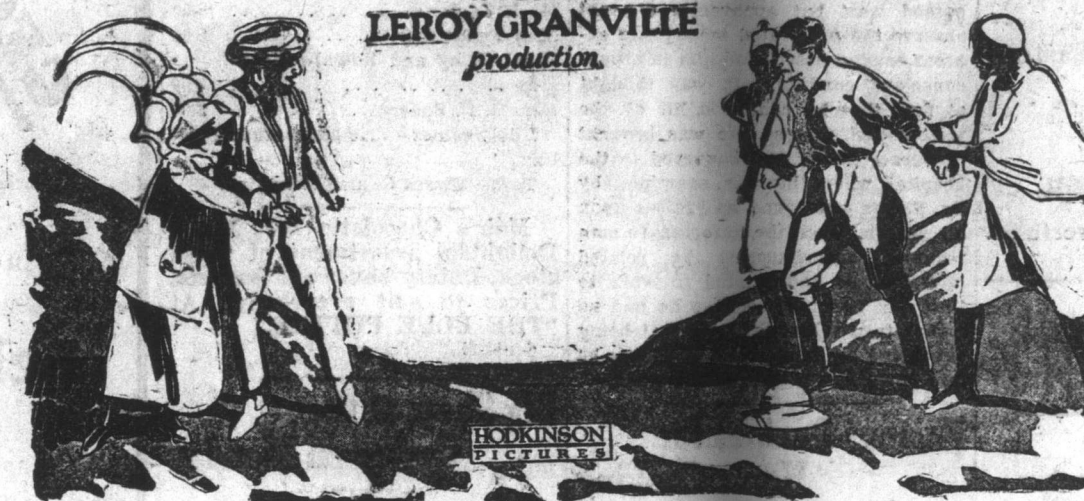

weight boxing champion, defended his title in Edinburgh, November 27th, when T. Milligan, of Hamilton, was his opponent.

Lewis, a much older man than Milligan, was outpointed practically all through the fight and Milligan was a winner on points.

In the opening round Lewis scored with his left, but the Scot replied with a stinging jab, which shook his opponent. Both were cautioned for holding. Milligan got to close range in the second round and punished Lewis, and he continued to be the aggressor throughout the next round. Lewis had the better of some scrambling boxing in the fourth round, but the Scot had established a lead on points. He punished Lewis severely in the fifth and drove him round the ring landing lefts and rights to the head and body.

Lewis used the ring to great advantage in the sixth round, and repeatedly made Milligan miss. A hard left dazed the Scot, but the bell came to his relief.

Lewis's boxing improved in the seventh, eighth, and ninth rounds, but the speed began to tell, and while Lewis tired perceptibly, Milligan was as strong as when he began.

The Scot outboxed Lewis in the tenth at long range, but in the next Lewis was seen at his best, landing frequently with telling uppercuts. Lewis fought with great determination, but he was unable to keep Milligan away, and the Scot scored in the twelfth and thirteenth rounds. In the sixteenth Milligan had Lewis groggy with a left hook, and the champion was almost out in the eighteenth from a right to the point. Milligan added to his lead in the last two rounds and was a clear winner on points.

STORY OF RUSSIAN PEASANT GIRL WHO MARRIES INTO SOCIETY, PROMISES ENTERTAINMENT

CRICKET.

M. C. C.'s Splendid Victory.

Left to get 300 runs to win, the M. C. C. at Sydney, Australia, Nov. 28th, made ample amends for previous shortcomings and gained a brilliant victory over New South Wales by three wickets.

Hobbs and Sutcliffe made victory possible by putting up 91 runs together for the first wicket. Hobbs, according to Reuter, played a magnificent innings, while Hendren, with 46, made his record for the match 121 for once out.

There came an anxious period for the M.C.C. when, with five wickets down, they still needed 117 runs; but A. P. F. Chapman, full of aggression from the start, hit the bowling to all parts of the field and in an hour he scored 72, which included 10 4's.

His great innings was warmly applauded by the crowd of 17,000 people, put the issue beyond doubt, and soon after six o'clock A. E. R. Gilligan made the winning hit.

The first innings resulted as follows:—N.S.W., 271; M.C.C., 193. In the second innings N.S.W. obtained 221 and the M.C.C. 301 for 7 wickets.
