Lime in Spraying. Orchardists have become well acquainted with the fact that to prevent arsenic from with the fact that to prevent arsenic from injuring the foliage of fruit trees when applied for spraying, it should not constitute more than a pound in 200 gallons of water, and on the peach not more than one pound in 300. The use of lime to prevent injury to the foliage has also become more or less known. Professor A. J. Cook writes to the New York Tribune that by the use of lime water instead of pure water, applied in spraying, injury to the foliage is entirely prevented. The lime water was formed by putting from one to four pounds of thoroughly slaked lime into 100 gallons of water, which must be carefully and thoroughly soaked to prevent injury to the foliage. Several applications were made at intervals of ten days, with equal success.

Goose raising pays, especially when they are fattened for market. When large enough, a number should be shut up in a warm, dry place, and given all the oats (thrown in a bucket of drinking water) that they will eat. This feed should be continued for about three weeks. The floor of the pen in which they are kept should be covered with clean straw, which will keep the feathers from becoming spoiled. They

must have neither food or water at least twelve hours before killing.

Mr. Tegetmeir, the English authority, says that where there is good convenience for keeping geese, and they can obtain a large proportion of their own food on the pasture land and stubble, there is no dobbt that they can be made to pay well, and the old stock can be kept in a productive condition much longer than is the case with sny other poultry; in fact, geese of 10 cr even 20 years appear to be quite as prolificas those that are younger. Both the Toulouse and the Embden geese are especially recommend. They are the heaviest of the goose tribe. The Toulouse crossed upon the Embden gives increased size and prolificacy.
