The London and the St. Thomas Kadia Railway Bills.

St. Thomas Did Not Want Electric Railway Communication With London, Fearing Competit.on-Arguments Before the Committee of the Legislature.

(Special to the "Advertiser.") PARLIAMENT HOUSE, TORONTO, April 5. - By a tie vote in the railway committee, decided by the casting vote of the chairman, Hon. E. H. Bronson, the London and Western Ontario Electric Railway Company has been refused a charter, and the two smaller lines, the London Radial Electric Railway and the St. Thomas Radial Electric Railway, are to be allowed to tap the counties of Elgin and Middlesex for

their respective cities. This determination was arrived at after a discussion of half an hour. Mr. E. R. Cameron represented the two smaller com panies, while from St. Thomas came Mayor

Idsardi and Ald. McCully, Col. Stacey and Engineer Bell. For the London and Western Ontario Railway appeared Messrs. I. F. Hellmuth and C. H. Ivey, while there were also present Messrs. H. A. Everett, T. H. Small-


man and S. R. Break. The three bills were first of all taken up to consider the advisability of placing together. The London Radial and the St. a candidate in the field at the next Do-Thomas Radial lines being arrayed in opposition to the London and Western Ontario. Mr. Allan Bogue, as is generally known, Mr. Cameron opened the discussion, urging that the two smaller lines were local enterprises promoted by business men of the respective cities. They would not trench upon each other, he said, while the other would be in competition with both and was controlled by American capitalists. He argued strongly in favor of lines that would cause trade to center in the county towns instead of those that would attract trade to larger centers.

Mr. Hellmuth spoke for the London and Western Ontario Railway, urging that the smaller lines led from nowhere to nowhere, and asking that the committee give it a chance to offer the choice to the municipalities concerned as to which of the two sets of lines they would choose. He also argued strongly against the principle of lines being confined to the counties, seeing no reason for such artificial limitations.

Mr. Cameron replied that the points proposed to be touched by the London and Western Ontario line were already well served by railways, while the other two lines proposed to reach places not already served by railways, and so subserve local interests. St. Thomas, in particular, did not wish to have this line between it and London.

Mayor Idsardi opposed the London and Western Ontario line on the ground

of it centralizing effect. Then Mr. Awrey took the field in be-half of the London radial line, resting his principal objection to the longest line on what he declared to be a fact that the west of the Province is on the verge of a great electric railway monopoly, the city and the rural lines all being in the same hands. The Province had enough of these, he said. Further, he asserted that the men at the back of the London and Western Ontario charter were the same as those controlling the Toronto and London lines, and this led to a discussion, Mr. Whitney holding that this was not the case. Mr. McLean, Dr. Meacham and Mr. Brower argued on behalf of the small

The company proposes to put in telephones all over the country at a uniform price of \$25 a year.
