In conclusion, he tendered the line "Learn to labor and to wait," from Longfellow's "Psalm of Life," as an appro-

priate motto to be taken to heart by the children. Mayor Little received a perfect ovation. Before presenting the medals, he took the opportunity of stating the pride he felt in the school. He agreed with Mr. Murphy, and not only was the school a credit to the city, but a credit to the Province. He had very little idea of the number of pupils at-tending the school. He had a sort of hazy notion that they had a large number of pupils, but he almost felt puzzled in standing before such a large crowd. He was not in the habit of addressing such an audience, but was more than delighted to see so many happy faces, so many healthy facesand so many good-looking faces. (Applause.) He did not come to advise or lecture-he was sure they got enough of that in school. (Laughter.) Proceeding, the mayor complimented the pupils on the excellent order kept, and assured them that the decorum was much better than that observed at the school he attended, or even at the Sunday school with which he was connected in his youth. (Laughter.) To the maxims laid down by the former speaker he added another—"Aim at being transparently honest and truth-Then the mayor told how a sneak ful." was despised in business.
