Toronto, Jan. 8.—The Hyams case was

Many Medals

Presented Yesterday to Successful
High School PupilsBy Mayor Little and Several of the
Trustees—The Robinson Medals,
Governor-General's and Boylo
Memorial Medals—and
the Winners.Over 700 Collegiate Institute pupils
assembled in the upper assembly
room yesterday afternoon to wit-
ness the presentation of the
Robinson medals, the Governor-
General's medal, and the Boyle
memorial medal to the successful pup-
il. Mayor Little and Trustees Mur-
phy, Wilkins, Carson, Greenlees, Lo-
gan, Campbell, Sanders, Alexander and
Stephenson were present, together with
about a score of relatives and friends
of the medalists. The pupils appeared
to enjoy the proceedings greatly, and
they were devoid of merriment when
a speaker committed a lapsus linguae.Chairman Murphy was in his element,
presiding over the large class,
as he was for a number of years a
school teacher before he studied law.He stated that the day's exercises
marked one of the epochs in the lives
of the students who had been success-
ful, and he assured all the pupils pre-
sent that somewhere in life, whether in
learning or one of the sterner voca-
tions, there was a prize for each pupil.He quoted Hon. George W. Ross as
mentioning punctuality, regularity
and attention as the three great ave-
nues to success, and he added three
others, which he assured his hearers
were just as potent in leading to pros-
perity. They were perseverance, in-
dustry and obedience. Without the
last it was impossible to succeed in
any calling. Mr. Murphy created a
storm of applause by referring to the
London high school as the leading col-
legiate institute in North America. In
conclusion, he tendered the line "Learn
to labor and to wait," from Longfel-
low's "Psalm of Life," as an approp-
riate motto to be taken to heart by
the children.Mayor Little received a perfect ovation.
Before presenting the medals,
he said that it was a great honor and
pride he felt in the school. He agreed
with Mr. Murphy, and not only was
the school a credit to the city, but a
credit to the Province. He had very
little idea of the number of pupils at-
tending the school. He had a sort of
hazy notion that they had a large
number of pupils, but he almost felt
puzzled in standing before such a large
crowd. He was not in the habit of
addressing such an audience, but was
more than delighted to see so many
happy faces, so many healthy faces,
and so many good-looking faces. (Ap-
plause.) He did not come to advise or
lecture—he was sure they got enough
of that in school. (Laughter.) Pro-
ceeding, the mayor complimented the
pupils on the excellent order kept, and
assured them that the decorum was
much better than that observed at the
school he attended, or even at the Sun-
day school with which he was con-
nected in his youth. (Laughter.) To the
maxims laid down by the former
speaker he added another—"Aim at
being transparently honest and truth-
ful." Then the mayor told how a sneak
was despised in business. Employers
did not mind their hands having a
little quiet fun, but they disliked to
see them making a big pretense at
working as soon as the boss appeared
on the scene. The characteristic of ab-
solute truthfulness combined with per-
severance, regularity and obedience,
was certain to bring success, no matter
in what line of life their lot might be
cast.The late Mr. Wm. Robinson, the
donor of the medals which are to be
presented here today, was born in Ire-
land in the year 1812, and came to
Burford, Canada, in 1833," said the
mayor. "In the spring of 1839 he came
to London, and remained about two
years. He then went to Toronto and
Montreal, returning to London in 1853.
In the year 1857 he was appointed city
engineer, and held that office for over
21 years. He resigned after the com-
pletion of the waterworks in 1878, and
from that time until his death in 1894
lived a comparatively retired life. He
was in the front rank of his profession,
and whilst quiet and unassuming inhis manner, enjoyed the respect of all
parties. He was of unimpeachable in-
tegrity, scrupulously honest and con-
scientious even in the smallest mat-
ters. I mention these facts because
I am sure you will all appreciate the
value of medals the gift of such a
man." (Applause.)After reading the conditions laid
down in the will, the mayor called for
Miss Minnie Cripps, and, amid the ap-
plause of the school, presented her
with the first medal for being the most
industrious pupil in the institute. The
mayor said that Principal Merchant
had informed him that the recognition
was well merited.John R. Bone, who won the Rob-
inson medal for mathematics, was not
present. But Mr. Michael J. McGrady,
who by a vote of the pupils was con-
sidered the most popular pupil in the
school, was Mr. McGrady was large,
like the vote he polled, and towered
about six inches over the mayor's head
as Mr. Little looked up into his smil-
ing face in presenting the medal."Speech, speech!" cried the pupils, who
had fairly howled their appreciation
of Mr. McGrady's worth. But Mr. Mc-
Grady was modest and declined to
speak.I thought at first that the young
men had been ungallant in not select-
ing a young lady as the most popular
pupil," explained the mayor, "but Mr.
Merchant informs me that it was the
young ladies who voted for Mr. Mc-
Grady." (Laughter and applause.)Mr. Thomas Alexander, after a short
and rather humorous speech, pre-
sented Miss Jessie Anderson, while
Robert medal, for standing highest at
the recent entrance examination in the
fourth ward. Miss Anderson was also
presented by Dr. Campbell with the
Boyle memorial medal for her high
standing in the same examination.Trustee Greenlees presented Arthur
Wood with his medal, while Trustee
Logan did a similar favor for Drewe
Jarvis, who won the Governor-Gen-
eral's medal, for passing highest in the
city. Trustee Sanders made a short
address, and called on Albert Powe,
but the lad has since been removed to
Mantoulin Island. Trustee Wilkins
presented Charles Christy with his
medal, and Trustee Stephenson brought
the proceedings to a close by conferring
a similar honor upon Miss Gertrude Arm-
strong.After a few closing remarks by the
chairman, the classes were dismissed.

GONE UP IN SMOKE.

Four Conflagrations Involving a Loss of

News from Drummondville says the fire
there destroyed the whole business portion,
consisting of eight buildings, including the
postoffice and one hotel. Loss estimated at
\$100,000; partially insured.
