Live News in a Line.

Fifty per cent of the orange crop in Florida has been killed by the recent cold. Reports from the cattle ranges of Montana and North Dakota are much more favorable than was expected considering the excessive cold weather.

The weather all over the Dakotas, Montana and Manitoba, is now the warmest in 22 days. St. Paul and Calgary are the only points showing a temperature below zero.

The Sultan desires the services of a professor for a business college in Constantinople, who can lecture in French and is proficient in the business methods of the United States.

Nine persons escaped from the county jail at Athens, Ohio, about 4 o'clock Monday morning by boring out a panel of the inside door of the jail. Six of the nine are under indictment for felonies.

President Cleveland sent to the Senate on Monday a bulky package of documents in response to a resolution calling for information about the sealing in Bering Sea. The documents contain little of general interest.

J. L. Dickson, formerly cashier of the Melrose Banking Company, of Fayetteville, Ark., committed suicide Monday night by taking poison. Dickson was a defaulter to the amount of \$21,000. Fear of prosecution drove him to suicide.

Mr. Knapp Henderson, the sub-manager of the Bank of Montreal, is dangerously ill in that city.

The Patrons of Industry of Frontenac have endorsed the candidature of Mr. D. D. Rogers for the Dominion House.

Superintendent Bryant, of the dock yard at Halifax, by the death of an uncle in Philadelphia, falls heir to about \$20,000.

J. F. C. Haldane, of the city of Windsor, barrister-at-law, has been appointed a special examiner for the county of Essex.

Mr. Monahan, the official stenographer, injured in the Weston disaster, is still living at St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto, but his condition is most critical.

A Southampton dispatch says the cold and storm were the worst ever known there. The roads are completely blocked. No mails having got through since Thursday.

John Riggs, who was killed in the Grand Trunk Railway accident on Friday, was a brother of ex-Ald. Riggs, of Windsor. The deceased was engineer for 35 years and leaves a wife and three children.

Mr. Samuel Lanore, of Russell county, Canada, impaled himself chapping in the woods. He lifted himself by a branch above his head, but after walking home in dreadful agony died from his injuries.

A public meeting was held in Halifax Monday evening to take measures to relieve distress in Newfoundland, and subscriptions of goods and money will be sent by the steamer Newfoundland next Saturday.

Mr. Alex. Smith, M. C. R. conductor on train 23, while alighting at Clifton on Friday, slipped and injured his back. Subsequently when the train got stuck in the snow drift at Falls View he had both his cheeks and ears frozen.

NICELY NABBED.

A Couple of Counterfeiters Arrested in Ingersoll.

The Chief Manipulator of "the Queen" Confesses—The Men Arraigned—Good Work of Chief Skirving.

(Special correspondence of the "Advertiser.")

INGERSOLL, Feb. 11.—By the citizens of this town generally the statement that a gang of counterfeiters had been plying their nefarious avocation right in our midst would be received with incredulity. And yet such is the case. For some time past complaints have been numerous of the value of spurious coins, and Chief Skirving has been strongly of the opinion that the stuff was manufactured not a thousand miles from Ingersoll. He made inquiries among the merchants, and soon gathered sufficient information to warrant him in arresting a man named Jack Palmer, who resides on Oxford street, nearly opposite the O'Grady House. Accordingly yesterday morning that individual was taken in custody and conveyed to the lockup.

After the prisoner had been lodged in the cells Chief Skirving returned to Palmer's residence, and by judicious questioning obtained information from his daughter which confirmed his suspicions with regard to Palmer's unlawful transactions. The girl said she had often seen her father making counterfeit money, and described the modus operandi. The metal, she said, was melted in an iron spoon and then poured into a box of clay. A search of the premises led to the discovery of the outfit, which consisted of the dies, some of the metal and the material—a sort of clay—out of which the dies were made.

With this damaging evidence in his possession the chief, in company with Constable Shaddock, visited Palmer in the cell, when the guilty man confessed the whole transaction. "But I am not to blame in the matter," said he. "It was the other fellow who induced me to go into it and who supplied the material."

Further questioning brought out the information that Adam Ross was the "other fellow," and according to Palmer's story was at the bottom of the whole business.

Acting on the information just received a warrant was sworn out for Ross's arrest. He was found at a residence, Thames street north, about 5 o'clock in the afternoon and placed behind the bars. The prisoners were brought before Squire Stevens this morning, when they were remanded for a week.

It is suspected that others are also implicated, and some interesting developments are looked for.

The prisoners are both shiftless characters and have had no visible means of support for some time. Ross is a painter by trade, and was employed at the Noxon foundry some time ago. For the past year or so he has been doing jobs of painting around town, but for the most part has been idle.

Palmer has done no work to speak of for months, and it has been a mystery as to how he could exist so long upon no income.

Chief Skirving is to be commended for the skillful manner in which he has worked this case. If there are others in the business he will no doubt run them to earth before long. Some are inclined to the belief that Yankee sharpers were the originators of the scheme, and that the prisoners are but tools in their hands.

NOVA SCOTIA LEGISLATURE.

Financial Returns Brought Down—Not Debt of the Province \$1,809,310.

HALIFAX, Feb. 11.—In the House of Assembly this afternoon Provisional Secretary Fielding brought down the financial returns of revenue and expenditure of Nova Scotia for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1894. The year closed with a surplus of \$25,370. The revenue totaled \$888,218. Total liabilities of the province at the end of the fiscal year amounted to \$2,167,493; assets, \$1,358,182, showing the net debt to be \$1,809,310.

The girl has been sent home. Some of Brown's fellow-passengers are of the opinion that Brown exercised a hypnotic influence over the girl.

THE CAMPAIGN IS ON.

Big Liberal Meeting to Be Held at Three Rivers.

Charlton and Paterson Got a Grand Reception at Tilsonburg—Political Notes.

CHARLTON AND PATERSON.

TILSONBURG, Ont., Feb. 11.—A magnificent reception was given to Messrs. Charlton and Paterson on the occasion of their visit to Tilsonburg this evening. The hall was packed with a large number of the audience being ladies. The platform was beautifully decorated, and conspicuous among the mottoes were the ones hung over the Union Jack. "The old flag, but a new policy," and "Britain leads the world." "Liberals follow not the Britain of 1387, but the enlightened Britain of today." The chair was occupied by Mr. J. Carruthers, who, in an able speech, introduced the speakers of the evening.

Mr. Charlton confined himself chiefly to an answer to the charges made against his loyalty to Canadian interests in the matter of securing the admission of free lumber to the United States. These charges were made by Dr. Montague in a recent visit to Tilsonburg. Mr. Charlton, in a lucid manner, detailed the whole circumstances, and at frequent intervals made it abundantly clear to his audience that he had been actuated by the best interests of Canada, and pointed out that the Government had been glad to avail itself of the advantage secured. The manner in which the speech was received clearly indicated that Mr. Charlton stands firm in the affection of his constituents as an able and honest Canadian patriot. He showed how the public burdens had been increased by such expenditures as that of the Tay Canal.

Mr. Paterson, by his happy introduction of the audience, a large number of whom were Conservatives. In elegant terms he pictured the greatness and magnificent possibilities of the Dominion, and proceeded to ask why, with all the country needed to increase its population and wealth is fair dealing between man and man, and freedom from all taxation beyond the actual needs of the Government.

With fine humor he pointed out that if the protection of the sugar industry had been the cause of the reduction in price, by the same method of reasoning it could be shown that to protection was also due the fall of wheat from 11 to 80 cents per bushel. He contrasted the policies of the two parties, and in the happiest style spoke of Dr. Montague's claim that the Conservatives followed the example of Great Britain in the free policies and the enlightened and progressive England of today.

Mr. Charlton, in answer to a question, stated the position of the Liberal party and himself on the question of prohibition.

A resolution moved by Mr. W. El-Hot, a prominent farmer of Deerpark, and seconded by G. W. Hare, police magistrate, expressing confidence in Mr. Charlton and Mr. Paterson was carried with applause.

LIBERAL MASS MEETINGS.

MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 11.—A Liberal mass meeting took place at the Three Rivers on the 29th inst. Hon. Mr. Laurier, Hon. Joly de Lotbiniere and Mr. Tarte, M.P., will be speakers. The meeting is arranged for the district of Three Rivers, including Champlain, St. Maurice and Maskinonge.

Mr. A. Lucas has resigned his seat for the West Calgary district. Both he and A. Sifton will be candidates at the new election.

MICHIGAN WHEAT.

LANSING, Feb. 11.—The Michigan crop report for February says that in reply to the question, "Has wheat during January suffered injury from any cause?" 234 correspondents answer yes and 567 answer no. Farmers marketed 1,051,338 bushels of wheat in January, and 7,296,941 bushels from Aug. 1 to Jan. 30, which is 1,923,772 bushels more than reported marketed in the same months last year. The condition of live stock averages from 83 to 97.

BROSSEAU ARRAIGNED.

DETROIT, Feb. 11.—Wm. Brosseau was arraigned in Judge Whelan's court today on a charge of murdering J. J. Horace E. Pope. He declined to plead, and a plea of not guilty was entered. The date of the examination was fixed for Feb. 1, that being the date of Mrs. Pope's examination. Brosseau was represented by Lawyer P. S. Donohue, and his brother, Israel Brosseau, was present. There was little expression in his face, but he seemed relieved when the court was over, and two detectives took him to the county jail.

Y. P. S. E. CONVENTION.

GUELPH, Feb. 11.—At the South Wellington Union, Y. P. S. E. convention secretaries reported progress all along the lines. There are 22 societies in the union. The nominating committee's report of officers for the coming year was adopted, as follows: President, Mr. J. Burns, Rockwood; vice-presidents, presidents of local societies of the union; corresponding secretary, Miss Skinner, Guelph; recording secretary, Dr. J. P. Rogers, Pergus; treasurer, Miss Zimmerman; executive committee, the foremen, with Rev. Mr. Williams, Rev. Mr. Mullan, Mr. Leadlay and Mr. Bryden.

The Land for the Settler.

Speculators Who Fatten at the Expense of the Public

Much in Favor With the Government at Ottawa—The Taxpayers Losers Every Time.

The Liberal party long ago declared that the lands vested in the Crown should remain there until required for actual settlement. Are there no public grounds for such a declaration of policy? Have not the lands been unnecessarily locked up? Look at the tens of thousands of acres put into the hands of speculative companies, where they remained for years. They strove to make fortunes at the expense of the settlers. They failed, for the settler was turned away. During the last session of Parliament a railway charter was given, accompanied by a large grant, which was made to men without a dollar of money to invest in it. The road is not needed. It is not likely to be needed for many years to come. For what purpose was this charter given away? For what was the land grant attached? Why, to enable the men who received it to offer it in New York or London for valuable consideration. In every one of these charters it is thought there will be something handsome "for the boy." If it were not so they would not be sought. In many cases the men who receive the charters for the expenditure of a few dollars for advertising and printing expect to get the full value of the land from the men who have the money with which to build. The benefit of the land grant goes not to the settler, but to the charter speculator, and the public have the same fares to pay, and the same fares, as if the road had been constructed wholly without public aid. What do the people of this country mean by tolerating such a policy? What do they mean by permitting the public domain to be used to enrich private parties, instead of being employed to diminish the public burdens? But there are not the only evils which have arisen from this waste of the public domain. The number of railways which have been constructed have served to scatter the population over an immense country, which has had the effect of discouraging settlement, instead of promoting it. It is always of importance, once a country is open for settlement, that its colonization should go on rapidly. There is always a great deal of discomfort attendant upon the first settlement of a district so long as the population is sparse. It is of consequence that this period should be as short as possible, if the population are to remain contented, for

There is a corresponding scarcity in the market, as speculators are holding the stock for a still further rise.

WORK AND WAGES.

Brooklyn Trolley Strikers Want to Return to Work—Shoe Workers Go Out.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Feb. 11.—Master-workman Connelly, of D. A. 75, K. of L., said today the trolley strikers desire to return to work, and with the President Lewis of the Brooklyn Heights Railway Company, will take them back in a body. The men are willing to waive all demands previously made. President Lewis declares he will not discharge competent non-union men to make place for the strikers, but he is willing to take back former employees to fill places vacant.

LYONS, Mass., Feb. 11.—The stitchers and turn workers in Faneuil & Spinnery's shoe factory joined the other operatives in a sympathetic strike this afternoon, and now every department of the factory is idle.

Mother and Two Daughters Drowned.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Feb. 11.—Mrs. Wm. Siebert and her two daughters were drowned at Coraopolis today. The accident occurred while they were crossing the Ohio River on the ice.

Race Postponed.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—The Sullivan-Harding sailing match for the championship of England and £100, has been postponed until Feb. 18. It was to take place today, but the river was full of floating ice.
