Toronto, Sept. 29-3 p.m.—In Ontario today the weather has been cloudy and cooler, and a steady rain has fallen in the more eastern portion of the province. East of Montreal it has been comparatively warm and fair, and in Manitoba fine, with indications of a decided rise in temperature. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Kamloops, 35-64; Calgary, 34-76; Prince Albert, 22-64; Winnipeg, 18-50; Port Arthur, 25-38; Sault Ste. Marie, 32-40; Toronto, 46-56; Ottawa, 50-50; Montreal, 50-68; Quebec, 44-70; Halifax, 44-66.
Local temperatures: The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Friday, Sept. 29, were: Highest, 57°; lowest, 40°.
Today sun rises 6:14, sets 6:02; moon rises 2:09 a.m., sets 3:56 p.m.

THE PRESENTATION TO MR. MERCHANT

Detailed Account of the Pleasant Event at the Collegiate Institute.

Following is a fuller account of the presentation to Mr. Merchant, retiring principal of the Collegiate Institute. It was crowded out of yesterday's Advertiser:

Thursday, at 4 o'clock, Mr. Merchant was quietly summoned into the nearest classroom. The rest of the staff were all in waiting. Mr. Merchant was given a seat on the platform and the following address was read by Mr. Little, acting as chairman on behalf of the staff:

Dear Mr. Merchant,—We could not allow the occasion of your departure from our midst to pass by without the expression on our part of the mingled feelings with which we view the severance of the ties that have so long bound us together.
We recall with pleasure and gratitude the long term of years during which it has been our good fortune to be associated with you in the work of our collegiate, and we desire to bear testimony to the sterling qualities of mind and heart, which you have shown during those years. We are mindful of the active and unswerving support, which we have always received from you, and the pleasant relations which have always existed between yourself and us. We reflect with gratitude that under your inspiration and management it has been an honor to serve on the staff of the London Collegiate Institute, and that largely through your instrumentality we have had the privilege of being connected with the first collegiate in the province.

While regretting the severance of those ties that bind us together, we rejoice that you have been called by the government of the province to fill a higher position. We feel assured that the same success that has always attended your work and efforts will accompany you in your new field of labor. As a memorial of our good wishes, and hopes for a long and successful career, we ask you to accept this gift, and as you wear it we hope that day by day it will call up happy memories of pleasant years spent among us in London Collegiate Institute.

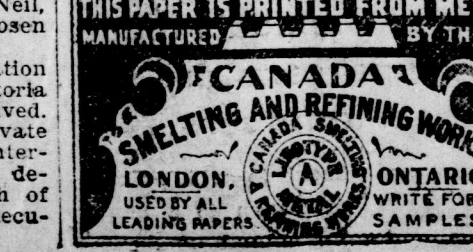
