HAMILTON STILL LOSING.

The local ball team is fast securing a cinch on the Canadian championship, and unless the Hams take a brace they will find themselves hopelessly distanced in the race. The locals had little trouble in landing yesterday's game, which was replete with errors and the snappiest kind of fielding. The visitors ran in the hardest kind of luck, repeatedly filling the bases, and then not a man scoring. Kostal pitched a steady game, and was at his best at critical stages. Buege also pitched a splendid brand of ball, and made three pretty singles. He is the hardest hitting pitcher on either team. McAndrews, who went to Minneapolis, was back on third for the Hams, and put up a star game. He hit the ball often and hard, fielded in good style and was a whirlwind on the bases. Pitcher Bradford played center for the visitors, and assisted in a double play. He also lammed the ball, but he generally fell into an outfielder's mitt. Bill Reid made a sensational catch of a long drive to deep center, and had to doff his cap to the stands on coming in to the bench. Manager Chub Collins took in the game from the bench, and did considerable talking to Umpire Popkay, whom he accused of giving the Hams decidedly the worst of it. In the ninth the Hams started in at a lively clip to try and tie matters. McAndrews sent a beauty to center for two bases, and Doran drove the ball to left, and McAndrews crossed the plate. Bradford then put the ball over the left field track, but Jones was there and got it, and the Hams did nothing for the next ten minutes but talk of horseshoes. The next man up, Bruyette, fanned, and Conwell was thrown

WHEEL.
COOPER LOWERS THE RECORD.
Washington, D. C., July 21.—Only three professional riders, Tom Cooper, Orlando Stevens and Jay Eaton, for today's races at the International Athletic Park. These riders agreed to ride a match of three one-third mile heats, and try for the one-mile competition world's record, recently lowered by Iver Lawson. Cooper succeeded in breaking the record, covering the mile in 1:58. In the match race Stevens won the first and third heats in 3:04 and 3:12, respectively, and Cooper the second heat in 53 seconds.

JIMMY MICHAEL WON.
Philadelphia, Pa., July 21.—The last of a series of three motor-paced races between Jimmy Michael and Floy McFarland, took place today on the Woodside Park track, and was won by Michael in 31 minutes 41½ seconds, the distance being 20 miles. This breaks the 20-mile record, motor paced, made at Boston, July 4, by Johnny Nelson. The first of the three races was won by McFarland on the Woodside track, July 4, and another match took place last Saturday at Manhattan Beach, N. Y. Michael winning after McFarland's pacing machine had broken. Today's race was to decide the championship of the world.

A REMARKABLE RIDE.

Cleveland, Ohio, July 23.—The 5,000 people who attended the Grand Circuit races on the opening day saw one record smothered and fast time in the other events. The great race of the day was the 2:08 trot, in which several of the fast stallions started. John Nolan was a hot favorite. In the first heat Tommy Britton had the pole, and John Nolan and Crescens were fighting for place. In the half Nolan broke badly, going back to the rear. Graton Boy was sent after Crescens, and the finish was a hot one. Crescens going under the wire at 2:07½. In the next heat Crescens led all the way round, making the first quarter in :30½, the half in 1:02½, the three-quarter in 1:34, and the mile in 2:06½. Nolan got down to steady work in the second heat, and covered the last half in 1:02½, but he was too far behind to overtake and pass the leader.
