PULP WOOD CONCESSIONS.

An animated debate took place on the minister of crown lands' motion to ratify the agreement between the government and the Keewatin Power Company. Mr. Davis denied the Company. Mr. Davis denied the charge that proper development of the industry had not resulted from the pulp wood agreements previously made. Great progress had been made in consequence of the concessions which progress would continue. The minister then outlined at length the agreement before the house, and claimed there was no monopoly, as whenever it was apparent that there was more pulpwood on these lands than the company required to run their mills for twenty-one years, the government could allow other companies to enter. At any time the crown saw fit they could raise the dues. This was an agreement, Mr. Davis concluded, which should commend itself to the

good judgment of every member of the house. (Ministerial applause.) Mr. Matheson said that, considering the manner in which these pulp wood concessions had been presented discussed in the past, no more outrageous, no more criminal act was ever committed by the government than the proposition now brought forward. He attacked the Spanish River and Nepigon concessions, and contended that all such concessions should be put up to auction, so that the province might get full returns.
