Adding 3,000 to the Steel Men Who Have Gone Out.

Another Effort Being Made to End the Strike—Basis of Settlement Suggested.

Joliet, Ill., Aug. 15 .- The four lodges of the Amalgamated Association of Employes of the Illinois Steel Company, at the Joliet mills, by a unanimous vote, decided tonight to obey the strike order of President Shaffer. The conference was in session from 3 o'clock this afternoon until 9 o'clock tonight before the decision was reached. The meeting was called by National Secretary Tighe, after his arrival here this morning. He was ac-companied by Vice-President Davis,

of the fourth district. This action will close the steel plant here, throwing out of employment nearly 3,000 men. Fires will be drawn tonight. The Joliet men had the same contract with the Illinois Steel Company as the South Chicago workers, who last night refused to listen to the arguments of Secretary Tighe. Mr. Tighe will leave for Mil-

waukee tonight.

The management of the works has posted an ultimatum that unless the men, numbering between 400 and 500, shall return to work next Monday, the plant will be closed indefinitely. ATTEMPT AT SETTLEMENT.

MRS. WILLIAMS GETS DIVORCE!

Wife of Former London Barber and Choir Singer

Secures Her Freedom by Evidence Consisting of Photographs Taken

Through a Skylight. By photographs and observations through a skylight in the ceiling of St. James' Methodist Church, Montreal, Mrs. Maude E. Williams, of New York, is today free from her husband, J. Marshall Williams, music teacher, formerly of this city. Supreme Court Justic McLean awarded Mrs. Williams the custody of their only child, Paul G., 8 years old. Mrs. Williams was Maude E. Miller, when in 1891 she married Williams in New York. He got an engagement as choirmaster of St. James' Church, Montreal, in 1898, and a room in the upper part of the church was set apart where he might teach pupils. Among them were many daughters of prom-

inent families. Soon rumors were heard that the professor was making love to the pu-pils, and a man repairing the church organ while Williams was instructing his pupils saw a pupil sitting in his lap while he was kissing her.

Affidavits were shown to trustees, a watch through the skylight was set, and photographs of what occurred taken later when Williams was making love to many pupils. He left Montreal in a hurry, going to Chillicothe, Mo. Mrs. Williams, on evidence secured, and despite Williams' denial, got a divorce decree. She has permission to resume her maiden name.

J. Marshall Williams was formerly a well-known resident of this city. He came here twelve or fourteen years ago from Paris, Ont., where his father still resides. Williams was a barber by trade, and worked in the shop of the late Thomas Tracy. Williams came to London at the instance of W. J. Birks, then organist of the Dun-das Center Methodist Church, and was a member of the choir quartet, his magnificent bass singing being a feature of the church's music. living here several years, Williams went to New York to study, and it was there he met and married the woman who has just secured her freedom. During his residence in Lon-don Williams' conduct was all that could be desired.
