Dairy Commissioner Willing To Be Inoculated With Tuberculosis as a Test.

Denver, Col., Aug. 15.—In view of the interest taken in the question of whether or not animal tuberculosis can be communicated to human beings, T. L. Monson, state dairy commissioner of Colorado, offers himself as a subject for thorough test, provided that a suitable annuity for his family be assured in case of fatal results.

Mr. Monson has made a study of the matter, and is a strong believer in Dr. Koch's theory.

PYTHONS FIGHT!

Male Monster Almost Kills Female Trying to Steal Her Breakfast—Hose Stops It.

Cincinnati, Aug. 16.—The giant Indian pythons, Jumbo and Queen Lil, had a fierce fight at the Zoological Gardens yesterday. Jumbo's length is 26 feet and Queen Lil's three feet less. A year ago they crossed the sea from their jungle as mates and until yesterday shared the same cage in amity. As Lil seized her rabbit for breakfast Jumbo's head arose and he coiled for a blow. His greenish-black body a second later was cast at his mate. His fangs fastened in her neck, and his body coiled around hers, pinioning her head to her body in a loop. Time and

again Jumbo struck at her neck, tearing the skin with his fangs. Poles thrust between the coils of the fighters were snapped like toothpicks.

Supt. Stephan, fearing that Lil would be killed, seized a large garden hose, to which he lashed a pole. As it was thrust towards Jumbo he exposed his fangs and the nozzle was thrust down his throat. Against the brass his fangs were powerless. Water was turned on and the snake's body soon swelled quadruple its normal size. For a moment only Jumbo withstood this attack, then released his victim. Lil lay motionless and was dragged to safety. Jumbo ultimately devoured the rabbit, and Lil was saturated with liniment and will recover.

JOLIET MEN JOIN STRIKERS

Adding 3,000 to the Steel Men Who Have Gone Out.

Another Effort Being Made to End the Strike—Basis of Settlement Suggested.

Joliet, Ill., Aug. 15.—The four lodges of the Amalgamated Association of Employees of the Illinois Steel Company, at the Joliet mills, by a unanimous vote, decided tonight to obey the strike order of President Shaffer. The conference was in session from 3 o'clock this afternoon until 9 o'clock tonight before the decision was reached. The meeting was called by National Secretary Tighe, after his arrival here this morning. He was accompanied by Vice-President Davis, of the fourth district.

This action will close the entire steel plant here, throwing out of employment nearly 3,000 men. Fires will be drawn tonight. The Joliet men had the same contract with the Illinois Steel Company as the South Chicago workers, who last night refused to listen to the arguments of Secretary Tighe. Mr. Tighe will leave for Milwaukee tonight.

The management of the works has posted an ultimatum that unless the men, numbering between 400 and 500, shall return to work next Monday, the plant will be closed indefinitely.

ATTEMPT AT SETTLEMENT.

Pittsburg, Aug. 15.—Once more there are efforts afoot to settle the steel strike. E. M. Caldwell, formerly an owner of Mingo Junction, is known to have conferred with the strike leaders with a view to sketching a basis of settlement, which he plans to lay before the officials of the steel corporation. He is believed to be the mysterious man who conferred with President Shaffer for more than two hours at the strike headquarters, although the latter said later that he had not seen Mr. Caldwell for months. late Charles Hunt, he came to Canada about 1860, and for some years acted as a grain buyer for Mr. Hunt, later being employed as bookkeeper in the City Mills.
