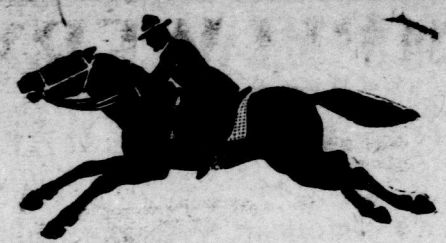

THE TRAINING OF CHILDREN

Interesting Sermon by Rev. Dyson Hague, of the Memorial Church.

Rev. Dyson Hague preached an eloquent sermon on "The Relation of Parent and Child" in the Memorial Church last night. "Example is what tells," said the reverend gentleman.

"If the parents live up to their principles, the child is more than likely to follow in the same way."

Continuing, Rev. Mr. Hague said: "Some parents thought it smart for a little boy to shake his tiny fist at his father. That iniquitous inordination," he said, "may bring that boy to the penitentiary some day. In place of seeing that this might be the case, a mother simply laughs at the little fellow."

The control of a child was largely in the domain of manners, yet some of the parents went to do away with punishment altogether. He had heard of a man addressing an audience of teachers who took a rod in his hand and said: "We are going to do with the reign of law; we have begun the reign of love." God forbid the reign of law should end, the inmates of the prisons would rejoice at such an announcement. He that spareth the rod hateth his son, and the child must be governed, and later, when it learned to accept the self-governing, there should be a mutual co-operation between parent and child.

In conclusion, Rev. Mr. Hague warned the parents against one constituting himself or herself a court of appeal against the child. God forbid of it, and the parents should be one in all things when dealing with the children.

LADY CONSTANCE IN HIGH REVELS

She Postpones Honeymoon and Holds Series of Entertain- ments for Her Folk.

London, May 23. — Lady Constance MacKenzie's unconventional wedding to Sir Stuart Richardson has been followed by an equally unconventional honeymoon. Lady Constance is called the "Queen of the Twentieth Century." Next week she and her husband will start upon a wedding tour that embraces half the earth.

There was a great farewell party at Lady Constance's house, where she gave them, until she had taken an adequate farewell of the tenantry and retainers of the Cromartie estate, so she gave them, as she herself put it, "a right good time of it," and there were rejoicings on a big scale.

On the night of her wedding day 200 guests sat down to dinner and were entertained with mediaeval lavishness within the walls of her old home, and the night was spent in dancing and feasting till dawn dispersed them.

Two nights later, nearly 1,000 guests thronged the stately mansion by Moray Pith and sang and danced and feasted till dawn dispersed them.

Her passion for athletics was given expression by her participation in a tremendous tug-of-war, with Lady Constance, her sister, and a girl friend as the captain on one side and a friend as the captain on the other.

These rejoicings over, the bride had to suppress his gaiety. Lady Constance was seen doing battle with a horse that is the terror of her stable.

THE THUNDERER AND HIS MAJESTY

Text of Sensational Article in Which the King Was Lectured.

Montreal, May 23.—The cable a few days ago brought the news that the London Times had openly criticised the King for his speeches in Ireland. The article in question has now come to hand by mail, and includes these remarks: "Ireland has a somewhat imperfect appreciation of the working of constitutional government. They are, at the same time, as suspicious a race as any on the face of the earth. They are very easily turned from enthusiasm to irritability by the disappointment of hopes, which are often wholly irrational and impossible. The importance they attach to the personal element in public affairs may lead them to identify a constitutional monarch with a course of policy for which they have no sympathy, and to the highest degree unreasonable and unfair to wrest the generous and good-natured language of the King in touching upon social or economic conditions in Ireland into an expression of personal views and prepossessions in regard to legislative and administrative action. Yet there is a risk that this may happen, and that the result, when the practical outcome of the events not found to correspond with popular anticipations and aspirations may be to produce an unpleasant reaction of feeling."

"We cannot doubt that the King's good sense and his long experience in the affairs of his country have enabled him to see the danger of this.
