FERGUSON WON MATTHEWS CUP

Were Nine Starters in the Harriers Race and All Finished the Course.

Hugh Ferguson last night won the Matthews cup in the harriers' race at the Y. M. C. A. The start and finish of the race were witnessed by quite a number of people. The course was from the association building to Broughs bridge, then along to Adelaide street bridge and back to the building. All of the nine who started completed the full course. Kenneth McLeod finished second and Wilbur Darch third. The time made by Ferguson was 45 minutes. McLeod was 15 seconds later, and Darch 1 minute and 20 seconds. The runners passed the bridge in the following order: Broughs bridge, Ferguson, Darch, Doss and Scott, Smith, McLeod, Jepson, McConchey, and Reid. Adelaide street bridge, Darch, Ferguson, McLeod, McConchey, Ross, Jepson, Smith, and Scott. The winner will have his name engraved on the cup, and with the second and third runners will be presented with a silver medal. The cup was presented by Ald. Matthews, and it will be competed for annually.

Darch, Doss, and Scott, timekeeper, and Mr. W. R. Marshall was judge.

The three biggest stakes of the year, not counting the Futurity, will be decided in the coming two weeks. The Suburban Handicap comes first, being the attraction of the opening day at Sheepshead Bay tomorrow. The American Derby will be run on Saturday, and one week later the \$50,000 World's Fair Handicap will be decided at St. Louis.

High Ball will not start in the American Derby at Chicago. Secretary James Howard is authority for this statement, which was given out this morning. He said that some positive statement respecting the possibilities of the eastern colt being sent to the aristocratic course.

The removal of this colt from the race leaves the event solely to western horses, excepting Port Hunter. This means that the fair weather English Lad and Moharib will be counted upon to fight it out with the Canadian colt. With other weather Moharib will be one of the several to fight with the easterner for supremacy.

This change in the field for the big race will bring about some change in the betting for the race. English Lad is still favorite, but Moharib takes the place of Highball as second choice and Port Hunter is made third choice.
