BORDEN TALKS AT INGERSOLL

Addresses Conservative Gathering in the Interests of Opposition Candidate.

Ingersoll, Ont., Sept. 28.—Premier Whitney did not come as expected. He arrived in New York on Sunday, and was not able to make the trip here. Hon. W. J. Hanna came instead of Premier Whitney.

Mr. R. L. Borden and Mr. Hanna arrived in Ingersoll at 11:40 o'clock and were met at the station by a large local delegation, the principal members being Messrs. Donald Sutherland, ex-M. P. J. A. Coulter, Dr. Coleridge, S. King, J. E. Boles, Thomas Seldin, Thomas Wells, J. L. Paterson and Charles O'Neill.

A special committee from Woodstock consisting of R. E. Butler, W. W. Nesbitt and V. L. Francis, was present. After the formalities of introduction a procession of gaily bedecked cabs conveyed the guests and committee on a tour of inspection of the town, proceeding to the home of Thomas Seldon on Albert street for lunch.

An excursion from Tillsonburg, Ontario and local points arrived here at 1 o'clock.

A procession, headed by Ingersoll and Tillsonburg bands, left Mr. Seldon's home at 1:30 and proceeded to King street rink, where the programme advertised was put on.

Mr. Borden, as usual, dealt with the alleged scandals, claiming that millions had been squandered at Ottawa. He said the 1903 platform had not been carried out as promised, also that the expenditure in the last twelve years was too great, there being nothing to show for it. He blamed the Government for the Quebec bridge disaster, and said the control of the International should be placed under a commission.

He also claimed that the preference was a failure. In fact, everything the Government had touched was wrong or a blunder. He concluded by predicting a victory on Oct. 26 and asked his hearers to support Donald Sutherland.

Messrs. Hanna, Cockburn and Sutherland also addressed the gathering.

ter was going through the same experience. There was no doubt that the coming generation would extol them for their great work.

Capt. R. I. Towers spoke briefly, thanking the electors for the splendid support given him at the last provincial election. He spoke of the great work done by the Liberal party during the past twelve years, and there was no doubt that the future policy of the Liberal party held in it.

The candidate's development.

The candidate was given a decided ovation when he arose to speak. He thanked them for the kindly reception. The enthusiasm was not for him personally, but for the cause he represented. As for his own record, he had tried to represent West Lambton to the best of his ability.

Proceeding, he also dealt with the record of the Laurier Government. He would not say that the Government was infallible; it was human, but it had given the people of Canada for twelve years a good, wholesome, clean government. Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues had advanced the interests of the people and had done so courageously. They had initiated new lines of policy and development, and as a result the Dominion had enjoyed wonderful prosperity.

The Conservative party and press would admit that the country of late had been developed, as never before. They would also admit that the population had increased beyond all expectations, and that the trade of the country had advanced enormously. The success of these things they asked that the Liberal party be turned out, because it is alleged that the Government spent more money than it should. They charge extravagance.

"So far as the expenditure is concerned," said Mr. Pardee, "I admit that it is three times greater than it was under Conservative rule. But I do not look askance at it nor apologize for it. The money was spent, and in return the country has enjoyed a degree of prosperity undreamed of under Conservative rule."

The greatest tests of a country's financial record are the amount of trade and the amount of revenue produced. It was true that the Conservatives spent \$43,000,000 in 1896, while last year the Liberals spent \$120,000,000. Yet with that smaller expenditure the Conservatives came down every year with a deficit, while the Liberals showed a surplus of \$19,000,000. The result of this expenditure of the Liberal party was increased transportation facilities, improved waterways, better postal regulations, and economical government.

The Tariff.

Speaking of the tariff, Mr. Pardee pointed out that it had been reduced one-seventh during Liberal rule. The tax on necessities had been greatly cut, while that on luxuries had been increased. It was altogether in favor of the poor man, and had given results that its best friends had not dared to hope for. The unrivalled prosperity of Canada was largely due to the good tariff. It would ruin the country, said Mr. Foster, but the reverse had been the case.

Mr. Pardee spoke of the great improvement of transportation facilities under the Laurier administration. The railways had been bettered, and the waterways deepened, with the result that the trade that once went to Boston, New York and Portland was now being handled at Montreal to the great advantage of Canadian shippers and merchants. The Government's policy had undoubtedly resulted in the greatest good to the greatest number.

The Conservative party under Mr. Borden had not attacked the policy of the Government. Mr. Borden had a platform, the Tories had a platform, and he seldom referred to that. Mr. Pardee asked his friends to read that platform and see if there was anything in it that had not been given by the Liberal Government. The only plank on which there was any difference at all was that of public ownership, but Mr. Borden had a string attached to it, and it could not rightly be called a plank at all.

The Scandal Issue.

The only issue brought by the Conservative party was that of scandal. It was impossible for the Government to keep every man in its employ strictly honest.

"There may have been some malfeasance of office, but take the scandals, every one of them, from the Arctic, the first to collapse, to the Hodgins charges, the last one to fall to pieces, the single act of malfeasance or corruption had been brought against any member of the House of Commons, or against any minister of the crown," said Mr. Pardee amid cheers. "They make insinuations, but they cannot nor dare they make a charge against any member of the Government."

"If you consider the questions of the day from a purely patriotic, purely Canadian standpoint, if you look at them from the viewpoint of your own best interests, there is no doubt that you will vote for the return of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his Government to power. I ask for your suffrages on the record of the Government today and during the past twelve years, and I am confident if that record is taken into account, the good, old constituency of West Lambton will send a supporter of Sir Wilfrid Laurier."

The Finance Minister.

Hon. Mr. Fielding was cheered to the echo on arising. He complimented the speakers who had preceded him on their fine presentation of the facts, adding that he did not see the necessity of sending down east "for a political tramp" to discuss the issues of the day. He was pleased to meet Dr. Fairbank, the Liberal candidate in East Lambton, and hoped to renew that acquaintance in Ottawa. He paid a tribute to Mr. F. F. Pardee, whom he characterized as one of the most talented and most industrious members of the House of Commons. The electors of Lambton would only be doing their duty to themselves and to him, they returned him by an increased majority on the evening of Oct. 26.

Proceeding, Mr. Fielding said the people of Canada should support Sir Wilfrid because he had given twelve years of good government. Some one will ask "what about the charges of graft and scandal?"

"You will be amazed to know," said Mr. Fielding, "that not one act of corruption or graft has been laid against a member of Parliament or a member of the Government. I will tell you to remember this. Do not forget that the Conservative party has not dared to make a charge against one member of the House. There is a procedure to follow if they do so desire, but they do not do so. They dare not."

"All that the Conservative party has done has been to cast suspicion," said Mr. Fielding. "And I have noticed that in every case their suspicions have been directed towards a Conservative office holder appointed by a Conservative Government. I was telling this to a Liberal one day, and he said: 'Serves you right. You should have turned them all out.'"

However, if a man does his duty, matter by whom he is appointed, he should not be turned out. As I said before, all the suspicions of the Conservative party have been directed against their own appointees. But let me say in justice to them, that while they have been charged with extravagance, malfeasance of office, and other like charges, none have been proved against them.

"Where there are thousands employed it is impossible that all should be equally intelligent, equally zealous, equally honest. But I do claim, with the limitations and and conditions, that the Laurier Government has given the people of Canada twelve years of good government. It is not a perfect, nor angelic, Government, and its members have sometimes worked longer hours than the labor unions call for. I will not say there has been no dishonesty, but I will say that the people of Canada for twelve years at least have enjoyed good, honest, clean government."

Proceeding, he spoke of the inquiry instituted by Mr. Justice Cassels, and declared that if any dishonesty was discovered, the guilty party would have to go.

The object of the scandal cry was to divert the attention of the people of Canada from the record of the past. That was the issue of which the Conservative party was afraid.

Three Great Tests.

There were three great tests of progress, growth of population, increased value of land and the growth of trade and commerce. He would not deal with the first. The fact was patent to all. Nor would he deal with the second, although all knew that the value of land in Canada had increased greatly since 1896.

But he would deal with the development of the trade and commerce of Canada during the past decade. During the eighteen years of Conservative rule, the total increase of trade was \$66,500,000, or about three and a half million dollars per annum. If the Liberal party had continued at that rate of progress during the twelve years of Liberal Government, the increase would have amounted to about forty millions, and so the account would have been square. But what increase did trade show in that time? asked Mr. Fielding. Not forty millions, but four hundred and eleven millions, over ten times that amount. That increase, said Mr. Fielding, was due to the good tariff of the Liberal Government.

"The Conservatives declare on the stump that we have adopted the National Policy. Mr. Borden avowed the same thing a few days ago. What is the truth of the matter? Did Sir Charles Tupper, in 1897, when this tariff was brought down, say: 'You have adopted our policy, the National Policy? I congratulate you in following out our policy.' No. He declared the tariff was a wrong, and that no greater wrong had ever been done to the people of Canada than this policy. He declared that there would be a sorrowful wall when the policy was made known. The people did not give adherence to a sorrowful wall, although Sir

Charles Tupper did. Why did he, if the policy was that of the Conservative party? He knew it was not the N. P., and Mr. Borden knows that now. If we have the old policy, we must understand it better. Is it not policy to leave it in the hands of those who know how to work it, rather than put it in the hands of those who do not know how to work it? but who do not know how to work it? Mr. Fielding showed that the policy had spelled prosperity for the country, and had brought happiness and contentment.

Adequate Protection.

"Mr. Borden almost every session makes a speech on adequate protection. I do not know what he means. I don't know what he knows. Does he know a higher tariff? If we have the N. P. why does he want a higher schedule? When the last revision came up in the House, the Government were able to solve the problem so satisfactorily that there was not even a division on the question. Why, then, did not Mr. Borden ask to have it raised or lowered, if it was not right?"

Sound Financing.

The Liberal party would be returned because it had given the country sound finance for the past twelve years. During the eighteen years of Conservative rule, the average deficit amounted to \$415,000, while the average surplus of the Liberal party amounted to \$3,500,000. This has no mean in a million dollars to the good. Good business management has done this, and the system has advanced. Now we give you the further home, rural free mail delivery. The Conservatives say, "That is our policy. We are going to give it to the people." It is rather late for the Conservative party to begin improvements on the postal system. There was a time when they had an opportunity to do things, but all they did was tax, tax, tax."

Wise Expenditure.

"Wise expenditure is true economy," said Mr. Fielding, and the record of the Liberal Government demonstrated that they had spent much money, but had spent it wisely and for the public good. Settlers had been brought to Canada, the land had been cultivated, the waterways improved, and the general conditions bettered, with the result that

the twentieth century would belong to Canada.

"In 1896 25,000 immigrants came into Canada. Now there were 260,000, said Mr. Fielding. We are adding one province like Prince Edward Island to Canada every year. Sir William Van Horne stated that prior to 1896 Canada was living on a back street. Now she was on the front street displaying her wares to the world."

"We have spent \$20,000,000 on railroad subsidies. That is a big sum you will admit. But listen. We took the principle that the land should belong to the settlers, and we did not give away an acre to the railroad companies. The Conservative party gave away 32,000,000 acres of land besides millions of money. If that land were valued as Mr. Ames values land on which money has been made in his lantern slide lectures, it would reach the enormous figure of \$45,000,000. Let the Conservative party discuss that when land deals are mentioned. The land is for the settler and the railroad promoter has not received any from the Liberal Government."

In concluding, he asked for the renewed confidence of the electors of Sarina in the Government which had accomplished much for the people. He hoped that both Mr. Pardee and Dr. Fairbank would be elected by hand-some majorities.

The meeting broke up with cheers for the candidates and for Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the King.
