HAPPENINGS OF A DAY IN BUSY EAST LONDON.

**STREET RAILWAY
WRECKER KEPT BUSY**
Had Two Calls on Saturday Night to Clear the Line.

The street railway company is having its trouble these days, the wrecker having had two calls Saturday evening, both mishaps blocking the line. About 10 o'clock, Wellington car No. 16 left the rails at McClary avenue and High street, running onto the west sidewalk. The car was going at a rapid rate down the hill, when the accident occurred, and the motorman was unable to stop it until the front vestibule stood across the sidewalk. The wrecker was called and replaced it after midnight.

Shortly after the first call came in on the wrecker, Ottawa car No. 116 ran over the derail east of the Pere Marquette tracks on Ottawa street. The wrecker was busy in South London, and all cars were therefore ordered to run over Hamilton road, leaving the section accommodated by the Ottawa line without a service.

The crew, with the assistance of a number of neighbors succeeded in replacing the car at midnight.

This morning at 11 o'clock the mechanism on Wellington car 76 went wrong. It was removed to the barns for repairs.

The company is installing a system of automatic circuit breakers at the power house, which will be a big improvement on the old system, whereby the whole system was tied up when the trolley wire broke.

The new system of switches cuts off the line on which the trouble occurs alone.

Was Badly Burned by Fire Crackers on May 24.

He is being attended by a physician and it is thought that he will recover completely, although it was feared that he would be crippled.

It will be remembered that a number of boys set fire to a package of

fire crackers which he was carrying. His pocket burning him fearfully, open and extinguished them with sand from a trench, probably saving his life.

At the corner, the animal freed itself from the weight and started in earnest, touching nothing but the bumps, which are quite numerous on the road.

In record time the horse crossed the C. P. R. tracks and came to a halt at Waterloo and Piccadilly, where the driver recovered it. The outfit was not damaged.

The Grand Trunk or any other customer's revenue will be increased considerably, and we will be in a better financial position than ever. I think the scheme is a good one."

But Little Discussion.
There was little discussion when the plan was submitted. The commissioners all expressed themselves as well disposed towards it, and were of the opinion that it would carry with the people.

Water By Next Summer.
In the event of the vote being favorable, the Kilworth supply can be brought into the city before the dry spell next summer, and the city will be protected from the dangerous experience of last summer.

"I have all my levels taken and everything is ready to go ahead with the work as soon as possible," said Engineer Moore. "We could get the water here before early summer, considerably before a shortage in the water supply would be felt. We would lose no time."

"How many people do you expect this increased source would supply?" was asked.

Water for 75,000 People.
"It should do the city until there were at least 75,000 people," said Mr. Moore. "The measured flow is nearly half that of the present supply of the city, and with the increase we can get by development we certainly can supply the city for a considerable length of time."

SELF-TALKING TELEPHONE

Detroit, Nov. 29. — J. F. Land, formerly with the Michigan Telephone Company, and an expert known throughout the country in his business, has begun the manufacture of a device which will answer the calls of telephones when the person called is out. It will repeat twice to each call of the phone any message the person expecting to be called desires to impart to it. Mr. Land has incorporated the company as the American Automatic Telephone Company. The usefulness of the device was explained today by the president of the company, E. M. Hopkins.

"There are many things about the annunciator that commend it to the public," said Mr. Hopkins. "See what a convenience it will be to the doctor. He leaves his office at times when there is nobody to answer the phone, which may cause him to lose a patient or may cause much worry at the home of the sick. The phonograph arrangement is sold the piece to speak, and during his absence it answers the telephone. No matter how many calls it tells when the doctor will be back; perhaps it tells where he is if he wishes to impart that information. When the lawyer is out it will be just as handy, telling him before what judge he is and when he will be back. In fact
