BIG CELEBRATION
IS IN FULL SWING

Ingersoll Old Boys and Girls Having Record-Breaking Reunion.

Ingersoll, Aug. 16.—Ingersoll has commenced to celebrate. Her streets at an early hour this morning presented a sea of jolly faces.

The streets are a blaze of glory in all directions. Banners and pennons, flags and bunting, streamer, arch and evergreen, adorn the homes, the stores, the manufacturing establishments, the streets above and below.

The Procession.

At 10:30 this morning a monster calthumpian and trades procession was the feature of the early manufacturing establishment and mercantile centre in Ingersoll was represented. The Beachville calthumpians were present and held the initial place of honor in the lineup.

The procession, which was about a mile long, started from the market square and paraded the principal streets of the town before noon. It was headed by carriages containing Chieftain McDonald, and Messrs. A. Macaulay, R. H. Reid and F. J. Fisher, marshaled by the local section of the Twenty-fourth Cavalry under the command of Major Mayberry, M.L.A., and Capt. Edgar. The remaining attractions, floats, bands, etc., occupied the line in the following order: The London Pipers, the Beachville Band, the Bonny Maids, the Beachville, the Beachville contingent headed by a gaily bedecked automobile, consisting of the Flower Girls, the Old Time Cart, the Famed Foul Deed, the Cowboys, the Past Race, "In the Northwest We Trusted," the Rubes and all the rest of them from the neighboring villages. BATTLES FOR LIFE
WITH FALLS WHIRLPOOL

Eighteen-Year Boy Puts Up Spectacular Struggle Before Onlookers.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Aug. 16.—August Sporer, an 18-year-old boy, of Niagara Falls, N. Y., went to his death this afternoon in the Whirlpool Rapids after a gallant battle with the giant waves between the lower bridges and the pool.

With three companions Sporer went for a swim in the river at the Old Maid of the Mist landing. He struck out at once for the middle of the stream, and then turned toward the bridges. His companions called to him to turn back, for the current is very swift at that point, but he kept on down stream, and was caught in the great sweep, the first break from the smoother waters to the rapids.

The boy battled for a time against the current, but to no avail. Then, evidently realizing that he was beyond human help, and was to be carried through the rapids, which took the life of Capt. and which while he resisted every unaided human effort at passage, he deliberately turned down stream and began a grim fight for life.

Not in all the history of the river has such a brave battle been witnessed. Although but a frail boy, Sporer went into the rapids swimming strongly, and held his own until he struck the giant wave which curls up opposite the old Buttery elevator. Then he went under, and for a second was lost to sight of the score of people who stood on the lower arch bridge.

Again and again he disappeared, only to reappear, each time fighting desperately against the terrible current, but when within 300 yards of the whirlpool his strength gave out, he sank and was lost to view.

Even then he had swum perhaps 100 yards farther than did the great English swimmer, Captain Webb.

The body could now be seen in the whirlpool, where river men are waiting for it to be brought in shore far enough to be caught.

DETROIT FOUNDRIES
IN BIG MERGER

Aluminum Casting Company, of Ohio, Is the Absorbing Concern.

Detroit, Aug. 17.—Announcement was made yesterday by officials of the Allyn Brass Foundry Company, of an important consolidation of aluminum casting establishments throughout the country, and that the principal plant is to be located in Detroit.

The Aluminum Castings Company, just incorporated in Ohio, is the absorbing company. The position it occupies in the industrial world is something like that of the General Motors Company, which has been acquiring the stock of automobile companies. The Aluminum Castings Company, with a capitalization of \$300,000, acquires the properties of the Allyn Brass Foundry Company, Cleveland; the Allyn Brass Foundry Company, Detroit; the Allyn Brass Foundry Company, Buffalo; the Syracuse Aluminum and Bronze Company, Syracuse; the Eclipse Foundry Company, Detroit, and the United States Aluminum Company, New Kensington, Pa. All these acquisitions are made at once.

The capitalization hardily represents the business, for the Allyn Company, of Detroit, alone, turns out \$1,000,000 of castings a year.

ALLIGATOR NABS THIEF

Saurian Police Prove Effective Guard Over Patch.

Cape Charles, Va., Aug. 17.—Edward Thompson's watermelon plantation, near Hornstown, a few miles distant from Cape Charles, is policed by alligators. One of these alligators last night caught John Ellison, a colored youth, 11 years old, in the act of lifting a juicy melon from the vine. The alligator seized the boy by the leg and held him fast. The young negro's screams brought Thompson, who took the thief into custody.

Thompson has one of the largest watermelon plantations in Virginia. In recent years the depredations of his neighbors have cost Thompson several thousands of dollars. He determined to put a stop to the thefts.

Last spring he had a number of alligators shipped to his farm from Florida. The animals were established in the melon patches, and their presence was widely advertised to the population. No one but the Ellison boy had ventured into the Thompson patches this season.

Ottawa, Aug. 17.—While the department of labor has not seen fit to encroach on the jurisdiction of the industrial disputes investigation act in the matter of the disputes in the Nova Scotia coal fields, inquiries at the department nevertheless show that since the inception of the trouble the department has been in communication with the parties concerned, and has been keeping a close watch on all proceedings.

SWEDEN'S STRIKE

Agricultural Works Have Refused to Join the Strikers.

Stockholm, Aug. 17.—The police yesterday prohibited a great demonstration that had been arranged by the strikers. The attempt to force the agricultural workers to go on strike, and refuse to harvest the crops, has proved a failure.

Hotel proprietors are appealing to the military governor of the city for permission to supply alcoholic liquors to guests who take substantial meals, in their places, on the ground that the prohibitions against such service is seriously affecting their tourist trade. CRETANS REFUSE
TO HAUL FLAG DOWN

Constantinople, Aug. 17.—It is reported that the Cretans have refused to obey the demand of the powers that they remove the Greek flag from the fortress at Canea. This makes the use of force inevitable.

The boycott of Greek steamers by Turkish merchants has begun at Saloniki, Smyrna, Gallipoli and elsewhere, in accordance with the proclamation of the committee of the union and progress (Young Turks).
