

A NEWFOUNDLAND PEER DEAD IN OLD LONDON

Earl of Stamford, Descendant of Lady Jane Grey, Gathered to His Fathers.

[Associated Press Cable.] London, May 25.—The Earl of Stamford died yesterday. He was born in St. Johns, Nfld., April 18, 1850. A son of Lord Grey of Groby, and a daughter, Lady Jane, survive. In politics the earl was a Liberal Unionist. His home was Dunham-Massey Hall, near Altrincham, in Cheshire.

William Grey, ninth Earl of Stamford, was the only member of the House of Lords who was a native of Newfoundland. The peerages held by him date from the beginning of the seventeenth century. King James II.

conferred the barony of Grey of Groby in 1603 upon Sir Henry Grey, son of Lord John Grey, and only nephew of the Marquis of Dorset and Duke of Suffolk, who was the father of Lady Jane Grey, for a few days queen of England. The Earldom of Stamford was confirmed on the first Lord Grey of Groby's grandson in spite of the fact that he had been a parliamentary commander during the civil war, and one of the judges to sign the warrant for the execution of King Charles I.

SENDS HER GRATITUDE THROUGH STRATHCONA

Queen-Mother Thanks Commissioner and Roosevelt for New World's Sympathy.

[Associated Press Cable.] London, May 25.—Queen-Mother Alexandra received Lord Strathcona, high commissioner of Canada, at Buckingham Palace yesterday. She asked him to convey to the people of Canada an expression of her gratitude for their love and sympathy at the time of her bereavement.

The queen-mother also received Theodore Roosevelt today. The two had a long chat, during which her majesty took occasion to personally tell the former president how much she appreciated the sympathy exhibited for her in the United States.

MARCH TO GALLOWS HALTED BY REPRIEVE

The Condemned Man's Lawyer Secured a Stay Until New Evidence Is Considered.

[Associated Press.] Philadelphia, May 24.—Carrying a reprieve, a messenger arrived at Moyamensing prison today from Harrisburg, a few hours ahead of the time set for the execution of Cecil L. Langer, of Johnston, N. Y., who was to have been put to death for murdering Paul Miller, during a brawl here, two years ago. An attorney representing Langer went to Harrisburg last night and interviewed Governor Stuart at midnight. A reprieve was asked for on the ground that new evidence favorable to the condemned man had been discovered. After considering the matter Governor Stuart reprieved Langer until June 23.

Preparations for the hanging were in progress when the messenger arrived at the prison with the reprieve.

MADRID BOMB THROWER WAS AWAITING ALFONSO

Intended to Assassinate Spanish Monarch Upon His Return From Edward's Funeral.

[Associated Press Cable.] Madrid, May 25.—Following a night of search and inquiry, the police believe today that the bomb exploded on Monday night was intended for King Alfonso. The explosive was hurled at the monument erected to the victims of the attempt against his majesty on his wedding day, May 31, 1905, but the authorities think that the original intention of the anarchist was to strike down the King upon his arrival at the railway station on his return from London.

As a result of this conviction the plans for King Alfonso's return have been changed, and it is now arranged for him to enter the city by automobile.

The bomb thrower, who was wounded by his own weapon, proves have been a South American.

Like Manuel Morales, who was believed to have headed the conspiracy against the King four years ago, the South American committed suicide, and it was found that his capture by the police was imminent. The police also point out that the man used a bomb constructed much like that employed by Morales, and which caused the death of 23 persons.

PEARY'S POLE FEAT WONDER OF DECADE

So Says Sir James Grant in Confering Edinburgh Degree.

Edinburgh, May 25.—Commander Robert E. Peary received the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from the University of Edinburgh today. The conferment was made before a distinguished company that gave the explorer a cordial welcome. In presenting the degree Sir James Grant, dean of the faculty of law, said that although the opening decade of the twentieth century had been notable for heroic achievements, nothing had moved the world to greater wonder than Peary's annexation of the North Pole.

BOMB FIEND IN HARLEM

Explosive Thrown From Window of a New York Subway Train.

[Associated Press.] New York, May 25.—The explosion of a bomb thrown from a train on the subway system as it was passing through the surface yards of the road on the edge of the Harlem canal yesterday, hurled a watchman from his feet and injured him severely, broke the hawser of a wrecking tug in the canal, and set her adrift, and created a panic among the tenants of a big apartment house near by.

The bomb is believed to have been hurled from an open window of a train where the thrower had no difficulty in escaping detection. Construction work by a Pennsylvania steel concern is progressing in the subway yards, and about 75 men are working there on the open shop system. Little damage was done the company's property.

BANKS TO THE RESCUE

Albany, May 25.—Vice-President James H. Perkins, representing the National Commercial Bank, and President Frederick Meade, acting for the First National Bank, both of this city, took formal charge of the business of the firm of Durant & Elmore, grain merchants. The two institutions hold upwards of \$500,000 of the company's paper, secured by bills of lading, of the Delaware and Hudson Railroad for grain cargoes.

Announcement was made that the two banks intended to act for the firm's creditors in liquidating the business of the company in order to avoid the expense of a receivership, counsel for the banks having decided that the assets of the company in

HEAVY CLUBBING AT MINERS' STRIKE RIOTS

Foreigners and Pennsylvania State Police in Hot Mix-Up Near Scranton.

[Associated Press.] Scranton, Pa., May 24.—A riot broke out among striking miners at No. 14 colliery of the Pennsylvania Coal Company near Pittston today, following an attempt of a posse of state police, headed by Sergt. Hennina to disperse a crowd of Italians who threatened others when a work train reached the colliery.

Sheriff Rodd, of Luzerne County, hurried to the colliery on the outbreak of the trouble and was shot at, but escaped the bullets, though a thrown coupling-pin gave him a scalp wound.

One of the foreigners, Peter Shua, was so badly clubbed by state policemen that he may die in the Pittston Hospital, where Sheriff Rodd hurried with him in an automobile, and also had his own wound dressed.

State Trooper Jasper was caught under his horse, which was held by a blow on the head, and he was badly clubbed before other troopers drove off his assailants. He was removed to barracks in a serious condition.

The riot was finally quelled, and another one broke out at the Ewen colliery, a mile away, but the rioters there dispersed when the troopers arrived.

The strike spread today to the Butler, the Hillside, and the Central collieries of the Pennsylvania Coal Company, leaving only the Barnum mine of that company in the Pittston district at work. Already ten thousand mine workers are involved.

END DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR

Substitution of a Department of Public Works Is Talked About in Washington.

Washington, May 25.—A sweeping change that may result in the demolition of the department of the interior or its subordination into a mere bureau, and the creation of a department of public works, today among men close to the administration.

While such a change may not be forthcoming for a long time, it is known that the President and his advisers have considered the idea seriously.

It is plain that the department of the interior has outgrown its usefulness, and that a new department comprising the Panama Canal commission, the irrigation service, the forest service, care of the water power sites, and many other branches of Government endeavor would be more efficacious.

The administration believes that such a concentration of business that affects public works directly could not but be of benefit to the Government, and that it would also prove economical.

A FATAL HOTEL FIRE.

Galesburg, Ill., May 24.—John Jacobs, of Galesburg, and "Bud" Miller, of Monmouth, were killed in a fire which destroyed the City Hotel of Monmouth. Edward Calhoun, of Galesburg, was badly injured by leaping from a second-story window of the structure.

Other guests had narrow escapes, but it is believed that all are accounted for. The body of Jacobs was found beside a broken lamp that is supposed to have exploded and caused the fire.

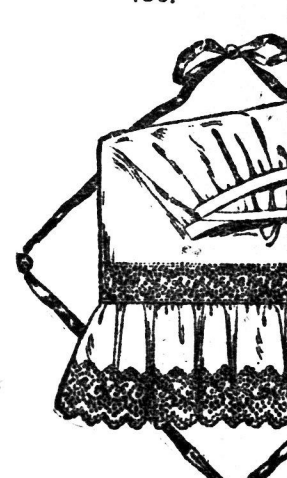
