FINGER PRINTS **CONVICT SLAYER**

Chicago Negro Is First To Be Found Guilty Solely on Such Lvidence.

Chicago, Nov. 10 .- Marking the first conviction on finger print evidence in the history of this country, Thomas Jennings, a negro, Thursday was found guilty by a jury of killing Clarence A. Hiller on the night of Sept. 9. The jurors felt so confident of the guilt of Jennings that the first ballot resulted in a unanimous vote of conviction. with eleven of the jurers demanding the death penalty and one life imprisonment. On the third ballot the death sentence was made unanimous. Counsel for Jennings asked for a new trial on the grounds that the finger print evidence should not be allowed. As a result, it is probable that the supreme court will be asked to rule on the use of such evidence in criminal cases. Judge Kavanagh, who presided at the Jennings trial. declared when objection was first
