SPLENDID GIFT FROM MEREDITHS

Sum of \$575 Donated to Decorate Maternity Ward of Victoria Hospital.

MR. JUDD IS CHAIRMAN

Was Again Chosen at a Meeting Held on Wednesday Afternoon—Superintendent Heard's Report.

At the first meeting of the hospital trust for 1911 held yesterday afternoon at the city hall, Mr. J. C. Judd, K.C., was elected chairman for the present year. Mayor Beattie nominated Mr. Judd and Mr. Harris seconded it. There was no opposition, the vote being unanimous.

"It is an honor to preside over a board having in charge so magnificent a hospital as Victoria," declared Mr. Judd. "I esteem it as such, and thank you most cordially for electing me."

All the members present extended a hearty welcome to Col. W. M. Gartschore to the board. All expressed the opinion that he was an acquisition to the trust, and all declared that he would become a tower of strength to the board.

Col. Gartschore thanked the members for their kindly reception, and he hoped that he would merit it. He would devote the best of his ability to the interests of the hospital.

A splendid gift.

A check for \$575 was received from Mr. Justice R. M. Meredith on behalf of the Meredith family for the cost of painting the maternity ward, and the outdoor department.

"I am sure we appreciate this most generous gift," stated Chairman Judd. "This is in addition to the \$5,500 expended by the family on the outdoor department."

On motion of Mayor Beattie, the gift was ordered to be suitably acknowledged by the secretary.

It was decided to award the contract for the sun room in connection with the tuberculosis ward to Jones Bros. for \$615.

The question of the purchase of power was brought up. Superintendent Heard stated that the annual bill was about \$2,000, and motors consuming about 75-horsepower were in use at the hospital.

It was decided to have the motors obtained from the London Electric and the city electrical department prices for the cost of power, and also the estimated cost of the installation of new motors.

The house committee during the month of January will be composed of Chairman Judd, Mr. J. C. Judd, Mr. Harris, and for the month of February Chairman Judd and Trustee Gartschore. They will alternate during the remainder of the year.

Superintendent Heard's Report.

Superintendent Heard submitted his monthly report for December, showing that 168 patients had been admitted, 51 males, 74 females, and 43 children. During the same period 159 had been discharged—18 males, 69 females, and 72 children. There were 15 deaths and 11 discharges. The number taking treatment on Dec. 31 was 131. The cash receipts were \$2,942.60.

NIAGARA POWER FOR VICTORIA HOSPITAL

Subject Was Discussed By the Board of Water Commissioners.

There was a lively debate over the question of the purchase of Niagara power by Victoria Hospital at the meeting of the water commissioners yesterday afternoon.

The debate was occasioned by a report from Manager Dark to the effect that the motors could be changed and the buildings wired for Niagara power at a cost not to exceed \$2,500.

Mayor Beattie pointed out that the trust had discussed the question, and had decided to ask the commissioners for a price of power, and an estimate of the cost of changing the motors.

"Why do not the hospital trust instruct us to furnish them with power?" asked Dr. Stevenson. "No matter what it cost, they should take it, and at once. Every cent they pay to another concern is lost money. The trust has no right to question the cost."

"Of course, they are businessmen, and want to know what everything is going to cost," answered the mayor. "They have to provide the money, and they can't afford to have a little knowledge of what the expenses are going to be in this regard. After all, we are sellers of power, and we should furnish the price."

"We are doing business in a business-like way," declared Dr. Stevenson. "We should not be compelled to chase our own people for power, but they should come to us. We will give them a good price, a fair price. If up-to-date motors were put in there, we would save them money each year."

After some further discussion, the matter was referred to the chairman, Mr. Judd, to take up with the hospital trust.

Rearrangement of Staff of Water and Electric Office Is Made.

At the meeting of the water commissioners yesterday afternoon, Mr. Oliver Ellwood, chairman of the board, and secretary of the board, will be re-elected to their respective offices.

Mr. A. E. Carothers and Mr. Tumbull, who are also employed in the city, will be re-elected to their respective offices.

With this rearrangement we can do the additional work in a proper manner, and the city will be benefited by the rearrangement of the staff of the water and electric office.

As there are some details yet to be worked out, Chairman Ellwood and Commissioner Tumbull have named a committee to continue this work.

Commissioner Stevenson wanted to define the duties of the various engineers, but as the board had so much to do, it was decided to hold a special meeting on Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock to discuss that matter.

Mr. A. E. Carothers should be in control of all the engineers of the city, declared Chairman Ellwood. "That I think would work for efficient service, and would result in better conditions in the city."

However, nothing was done in that regard, this afternoon's meeting being reserved for a discussion of that subject.

DISPOSING OF BOOKS OF LATE DEAN INNES

The Will Carried Out—An Explanation Which Puts an End to Unfounded Rumors.

Some unfounded rumors in regard to the disposition of the library of the late Very Rev. Dean Innes are in circulation. The following are the facts: The late Dean Innes left his library to his daughters, with certain instructions in regard to particular sets of works for individual friends. The remainder of the books were disposed of in accordance with the following words, quoted from the will:

"The balance of the books to be gone over by the principal of Huron College, he to choose such as he thinks would be useful to young men going forth as clergymen of the Diocese of Huron; said books to be made up into parcels or small libraries, that thus they might be assisted in the Divine Master's work. These gifts to be bestowed on such as are not able to buy for themselves."

This instruction was carried out and about 800 volumes came into the hands of the principal of Huron College, and every year when the graduates of Huron College go out they have received parcels of books of about equal size and value. The gift is not quite exhausted yet, but the most valuable and useful parts of the library have been disposed of as above described. There were some personal gifts to the late

Canon Dann, but there were no books left to the rectors of St. Paul's Cathedral, and any statement to the contrary is unwarranted.
