FATALITY PURELY AN ACCIDENT

Jury Exonerates C. P. R. and Crew for Death of Alonzo Player.

"That A. J. Player came to his death on May 10, 1911, at St. Joseph's Hospital, from injuries received by being struck by an eastbound freight on the C. P. R., at the Colborne street crossing, at about 4 p.m. the same day. The fatality was purely accidental, and we attribute no blame whatever to the crew of the said train."

The above verdict was rendered by the Jury, after due consideration of the evidence submitted at the inquest into the death of the late Alonzo J. Player, in the police court last night.

Some delay was caused by the failure of one of the jurymen to report for duty, and another feature of the inquest was the collapse of one of the witnesses, Fireman Wright, while giving evidence, in the witness box.

The Evidence.

Dr. W. J. Stevenson was called to attend the injured man in Buchannic coal and wood office shortly after the accident. Player was bleeding from the right ear and was in a semi-conscious condition. On further examination at St. Joseph's Hospital he was found to have sustained a fracture at the base of the internal ear.

Dr. Stevenson realized that the man's life could not be saved, and the patient relapsed into unconsciousness, followed by vomiting, which indicated hemorrhage at the base of the brain. Death followed in about two hours.
