Riley and his guard entered the smoker of one of the coaches, and nodded a farewell to the railwaymen and watchers on the platform, and as the train slowly pulled out of the station he gazed wistfully through the car window for a last look at the people when he said had last look at the people whom he said had treated him so kindly.

Arrive at Kingston at Three. Riley's train arrives in Kingston at 3 a.m. It will be met by the penitentiary officials and the London deputy will turn his prisoner over to them.

Disregard Warnings. Railroad men, who attended the inquest, stated last night, that people seemingly have become so used to the trains that they consider it impudent when a railroad employee warns them to be careful. "We often have people "Mind your own business" "Shut up", when we caution them to keep off the right of way when trains are passing", said one engineer.

Coroner's Jury Petitions Railway Commission to Do Away With "Death Traps."

PLACES BLAME ON VICTIM

Jurors Find He Was Careless in Walking Onto Tracks -Footboard Unguarded.

In view of the fact that so many deaths occur on railway tracks in London, Coroner Dr. R. MacLaren, and his jury inquiring into the death of Garside, who was instantly killed as the result of being struck by Grand Trunk yard engine 1430, at the Wellington street crossing on May 2, last night, drew up a recommenda-tion urging the Dominion railway commission to take prompt action to do away with the level crossings in Lon-

Victim Was Careless. The jury found that the late Mr. Garside met his death as the result of his being guilty of gross carelessness in placing himself in the position he did, but agreed that if a man had been on the rear foot-board, the accident would in all probability never have happened.

Charles G. Hunter, the principal witness of the accident, in the witness box old how he and his wife, with a baby in a carriage, arrived at the south side of the tracks in time to see the gates go down, and that they went around and onto the tracks, but were blocked from crossing by the way-freight going east. Hunter stated that he had seen the engine strike Garside about the knees. Hunter yelled and signalled, but it was too late. Garside was knocked down thrown across the tracks, and crushed by the engine. Hunter said the engine at the time of the accident was going slowly, but he heard no warning signal

Bell Was Ringing "The bell was Ringing.

### REV. FATHER DOYLE CLOSES EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS

Preaches Concluding Sermon at St. Peter's-School Children Addressed.

The Third Diocesan Eucharistic Congress at St. Peter's cathedral, was brought to a close last even-Rev. special devotions. Father Doyle, of the Redemptorist Order, preached the concluding sermon. He commented upon the greatness of the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist, stating that it was God's greatest gift to mankind. He said that in it were contained

God's greatest gifts and graces. Father Doyle referred to David's great love for God saying that it surpassed human understanding in its immensity. He contrasted it with man's present-day weakened affection for Christ.

"Poor human nature! We have the firm belief of saints and martyrs, in the Real Presence. They trusted and believed for twenty centuries.

If the clergy of the Catholic Church were to make the statement that we had power to raise the dead and had absolute proof of that power this church would not ontain the thousands who would flock to witness. Yet in the Holy Eucharist, Christ raises to life the dead soul which has been in mortal sin. He strengthens the weak and heals the sick.

"If we were to tell you that we had power to give you great wealth, you know very well that there would be even blood shed in the struggle to learn the secret. But Christ offers his wealth-love. Look at the sun, the moon and stars, the trees, the flowers, the simple blade of grass, they are but a ray of God's goodness of the wealth of his love for humanity. We cannot measure the immensity of Cod's love for man.

"He has given his only Son in the holy sacrifice of the mass. He has given you all you have. How little we give to im in return for his gifts."

Father Doyle commented on the mystery of the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. To those outside the church it was a deep mystery. It required faith in the understanding of it. He quoted the words of Christ to St. Thomas: "Because thou hast seen Thomas, thou hast believed, blessed are they who have not seen and have believed."

In conclusion, the speaker exhorted his hearers to open their hearts to God to strengthen their love for him. He urged them to be thoughtful of God's goodness to man, and of man's ingratitude to him.
