[Canadian Press.] SARAYEVO, June 29.—After the bodies of Archduke Francis Ferdinand and the Duchess of Hohenberg had reposed for a time in the chapel of the palace today they were transferred to a special train for transportation to Vienna. The executive of the Diet posted a manifesto throughout the city denouncing the crime that had ended the life of the heir to the Austrian throne and his wife, and expressing loyalty to Emperor Francis Joseph and the Hapsburg dynasty, for whose welfare the people of Bosnia and

Herzegovina were ready to sacrifice The manifesto also adjured the people to preserve their youth from the influence of seditious agitators, who poisoned the minds of their sons with subversive

and anarchistic ideas. Demonstrations Through Bosnia. Anti-Servian demonstrations are reported throughout Bosnia.

In many places Servians were attacked, and troops were called out to keep order. These demonstrations necessitated the proclamation of martial law, and the commander of the troops at Sarayevo exhorted the people, saying: "If you love your Emperor, then go quietly to your homes."

The majority of the populace immediately obeyed this request, and tonight the town is quiet. During the course of the day, however, two bombs were thrown, but only one person was slightly

Tory-Liquor Combination Puts McFarlan Across for the Second Time.

SUBURBAN MAJORITY BIG

Govt. Manipulation of Riding Aided Materially in Defeat of John Laidlaw.

The activities of the Conservative machine again carried East Middlesex for John McFarlan. Outside of the annexed districts of the City of London, the Conservative majority was however, only 138. The majority o 260 rolled up for McFarlan in the city suburbs was largely accounte for the Government's manipulation of the constituencies, with the resul a great many Liberal voters through misapprehension, failed t register, and were deprived of their franchise.

It was a majchine-won conquest and when it comes to machine-fight ing the Liberals have always admitted that in the local constituencies they are not in with their Tory oppo nents. And when one considers the Tory machine was backed with the entire force of the liquor interests of the country, one is not surprised that the will of the thoughtful majority of the people was defeated by the Tory machine, the Tory organization and their liquor allies.

Laidlaw's Good Run. John Laidlaw, the defeated candidate, made an excellent run, con-sidering the difficulties that were put in his way. Westminster, especially the polls nearest his home, showed most encouraging increases for him, while his opponent, Mr. McFarlan, did not have a majority even in his home township of West Nissouri. It was London township where the temperance-professing Tories failed to vote according to their principles, where Mr. McFarlan had a majority of 138. A poll was also taken in the suburbs, in spite of the Redistribution Act of the last Legislature, and here, of course, the Conservative candidate rolled up a big majority, 260, making a total of 398 that will be claimed by

(Special to the Advertiser.) WINDSOR, June 29.—All Essex County went Liberal in the election today.
