

to leave the flies alone and try to abolish disease? We can see flies and kill them or screen them out, but no one but a specialist with a microscope can see disease germs. Why not do the easy thing that we can do, instead of

trying to do the impossible? F. L. Y. Answer .- Have you ever known any community, big or little, that abolished flies? You think it is easy to do Do you know why it is not easy? Because wherever animals or man live, it is unavoidable that there should also enough food for myriads of flies, never mind how much care is exercised to lessen or remove their food supply. The things we need to live on are just what flies need too, and so long as we are humans, and flies are flies, we cannot literally starve them out. Of course, we can remove their breedng places—such as we can find. Of course, a great deal of continuous, enuous effort, kept up faithfully day fter day in hot weather, will prevent neir breeding in large quantities in eglected garbage or manure. But we o not, never have, and never will, seure such continuous strenuous servica n communities from the general pubc. It is work for specialists, and at st will reduce, not abolish, flies-beuse there will always be some places for them in which to breed. Even private houses it is often impossible find where they come from.
