at Annual Convention.

Philadelphia, Nov. 8.—Pronouncing the passage of the Clayton trust bill as organized labor's greatest single accomplishment for the last year, the executive council of the American Federation of Labor presented its annual report today to the thirty-fourth convention of the federation here. The voluminous document covers every question which has affected labor during the year, including the European war.

GERMANS PREPARE FOR
RETREAT FROM ANTWERPRepair Bridge Over Canal and Construct
Trenches—Volunteers Training.

London, Nov. 8.—A dispatch to the Times from Rotterdam says that a Dutchman, returning from Seizette, in East Flanders, states that the Germans have repaired the first bridge over the Ghent-Tormenten Canal, and between this and the next bridge are constructing the trenches facing in the direction of Antwerp. The Germans had been unable to repair the main railway bridge, which the Belgians destroyed.

VOLUNTEER OR BE
TAKEN UNWILLINGLYChoice Offered to Belgian Male Refugees
—To Relieve British.

London, Nov. 8.—Another call to the colors has been issued by the Belgian Government to all nationals. The summons this time is accompanied by an intimation that those not joining voluntarily may be "commandeered."

FRANCE LIKELY TO BE
FREED OF ABSINTHENew Order Also Forbids Sale of Similar
Liquors.

Paris, Nov. 8.—Permanent prohibition of the sale of absinthe and kindred alcoholic beverages in France may be a result of the war. Transportation and sale of absinthe were forbidden when the war began, but traffic in other intoxicants was continued. The government has now supplemented its original order with another, forbidding the sale of any alcoholic drinks similar to absinthe. There is a marked movement in all parts of France tending to pervert this prohibition.

AVIATOR DROPPED
BOMB ON BRUGES

(Canadian Press.)

London, Nov. 9—9:20 a.m.—An Amsterdam dispatch to Reuters Telegram Company says: The Telegram's correspondent at Stuis, Netherlands, says that on Saturday, before daylight, a British or French aviator dropped a bomb on Bruges, apparently destined for the railway station, but no damage was done. During the night, 15,000 Germans arrived at Bruges. Between Ostend and Nieuport all is quiet.

CAPT. KENDALL PROMOTED

Is Commander of Auxiliary British
Cruiser.

MONTREAL, Nov. 8.—Capt. Kendall, formerly captain of the Empress of Ireland, has been gazetted commander of the auxiliary British cruiser Calgarian. He was made lieutenant naval commander of the vessel soon after the war broke out; now he has been advanced to commander. It is understood that he is engaged in scout duty.

EXCHANGE ARRANGED
OF NON-COMBATANTSBritain and Austria To Liber-
ate Women, Children and
Elderly Men.

London, Nov. 8.—The official press bureau last night made the following announcement: "Arrangements have been made with Austria for exchanging women and children and males under sixteen years of age and over fifty, together with doctors, ministers and invalids. Proposals will be made for exchanging males of military age."

NEWFOUNDLAND FISHERS
SHIPPING THEIR CATCHBritain's Control of Atlantic Great Help
to Them—Demand Good.

St. John's, Newfoundland, Nov. 8.—The unimpeded movement of British shipping in the Atlantic has relieved the fears expressed by fish merchants at the outbreak of the European war that it would be impossible to market a large part of the season's catch of cod in Newfoundland waters. Large cargoes of dry codfish are now being loaded for Mediterranean ports, and the traders look for unusually good business. Brazil, because of the small supply otherwise available for that market. The total catch for the year around the Newfoundland coast is estimated at \$60,000 quintals, which is 250,000 quintals short of the average catch. In view of this shortage and the improved outlook for markets, the traders are making a vigorous effort to maintain a minimum price for dry codfish considerably higher than appeared possible three months ago.

MURDEROUS FIRE
DROVE BACK TURKSRussians Repulse Attempt to Surround
Their Right Wing.

Petrograd, Nov. 9.—The Russian army headquarters in Caucasus, who the day of November 7, sends the following official communication from Tiflis regarding the Russian operations: "Two Turkish divisions, with 45 pieces of field and several pieces of heavy artillery, and with a numerous band of Kurdish cavalry, moved in the direction of the hills of Hasean Kalah, twenty miles east of Erzerum, toward the position at Koprucki, which we occupied Friday night."
