"CLIMB A TREE, BOYS, AND GIVE YOUR SPINE A CHANCE TO STRAIGHTEN OUT," ADVISES CUTLER, WRESTLING CHAMPION

ASSOCIATION GIVEN MAJOR RECOGNITION

Big Minor League Becomes a Third Major League.

NO DETAILS GIVEN OUT

Draft Has Been Lifted and Other Concessions Granted.

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 28.—The American Association has won its fight for recognition as the third major league in organized baseball, President Chivington said today. The National Commission finally has acceded to the desires of the "double A" organization and has granted it territory in cities now occupied by the National or American Leagues, and a large number of players.

Arrangements for the elevation of the association will be made in a short time, according to Chivington. First news of the plan came in the form of a statement from James C. McGill, the Indianapolis club president, who announced that the draft had been lifted as far as the association was concerned.

Secrecy surrounds the details, and while Chivington admitted that the move was revolutionary, he declined to say what cities would be included and whether or not the circuit would be kept out. Whether or not an eastern town would be taken in, he would not say.

What the relations with other Class AA leagues will be, including the International and the Pacific Coast circuits, has not been determined.

"The change involves alterations in the national agreement as well as other details regarding the draft as between the association and the other circuits of its class.

"We have been trying for years to get these concessions from the National Commission," said President Chivington. "Recently we made strong overtures which were ignored, and the major leagues will regard us as equals in the future."

The association, as well as the other more powerful leagues, a few years ago began a campaign for enlargement of the Federal League helped bring about the concession just made public.
