

Off Scotland But No Lives Lost.

ON WAY TO MONTREAL

British and Danish Vessels Sent to Bottom Without Warning.

[Canadian Press.] MONTREAL, June 4.-The Canadian freighter Iona, of the Thomson Line was torpedoed and sunk by a German no lives were lost. The crew of about 54, with Capt. Ritchie, took to the small boats when they saw that the steamer was doomed, and they managed to land safely at Kirkwall, Scotland. There were no passengers on the Iona.

Word of the loss of the ship was received in Montreal this afternoon by the Robert Reford Company, agents for the Thomson Line, but no details were given. She left Middlesborough June 2, Occupy Two Towns on Way to bound for Montreal with scoria blocks

and a general cargo.

The steamship Iona was built in Dundee, Scotland, in 1892, by Gourley Bros. & Co. Her length was 360 feet, beam 44 feet 7 inches; depth of hold, 26 feet 3 inches. Her gross tonnage was 3,444, and she had a speed of 11% knots. She plied regularly between Montreal and

The Inkum left New York on May 22 for London. She was 302½ feet long and of 3,074 tons net. She was built at Glasgow in 1901, and was owned by the Gulf Transport Line, of Liverpool.

BRITISH TRAWLER TORPEDOED. LOWESTOFT, Eng., June 4. - The crew of a Lowestoft trawler were landed here today. They say that their vessel was stopped in the North Sea Thursday evening by a German submarine. The crew was ordered into the boats, after which the trawler was sunk by bombs.

STAVANGER, Sorway, June 4, Via London, 7:53 p.m.—The Danish steamer London, 7:53 p.m.—The Danish steamer Cyrus, with a cargo of coal from Burnt Island, Scotland, for Copenhagen, was torpedoed yesterday afternoon. The crew, none of whose members were injured, were landed today by a Norwegian steamer at Stavanger. The men state that the Cyrus was torpedoed

TOWNS IN HURON STILL WIDE OPEN

Deputation at Toronto Says C. T. A. Act Is Not Enforced.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, June 4.-Conditions in those municipalities in Huron County that went "dry" when the Canada temperance act came into force are not satisfactory, according to a temperance deputation from that county which interviewed the provincial liquor

license commission today.

The deputation consisted of Dr. A. J. Irwin, of Wingham, J. A. Irwin, of Clinton, and Dr. W. C. Thomson, of Clinton. They pointed out that the temperance act was difficult to enforce because of the absence of various powers vested in license and police affairs under local option. They made a request that the provincial commision assist through the appointment

Mr. Irwin said that the people in a town "dry" by local option were sat-isfied with the law enforcement, but in the Canada temperance act enforce-ment did not work out. There were drunken men on the streets of Exeter and the town was running wide open.

Chairman Flavelle declared he had little faith in the Canada temperance act, but promised the board would do everything in its power to have the law enforced.

LETTERS THREATENED TO BLOW UP CUNARD BOATS

Stillwagon was arrested after, according to the police, he had mailed another letter to the Cunard Line. The police declare that the prisoner admitted mailing the letters.

In several of the letters Stillwagon is alleged to have threatened to blow up vessels of the Cunard Line unless his demands were complied with. Immediately after the destruction of the Lusitania, the police charge, the writer of a letter received at the Cunard offices stated that one of his bombs placed in the ship before she sailed from New York was responsible for the disaster. ONE SPY ORDERED SHOT. ONE GOES TO PRISON

of Kuepfeale's Companion Are Found Guilty.

LONDON, June 4.—7:45 p.m.—Official announcement was made here tonight that a German spy named Muller had been sentenced to death. The announcement follows:

"The trial of two alleged spies, Muller and Hahn, held in camera at Old Bailey before the lord chief justice and Justices Avory and Lush, was concluded this afternoon. The jury found both prisoners guilty. Prisoner Muller was sentenced to death by shooting, and is to be handed over to a competent military authority for execution, subject to his right to appeal to the court of criminal appeal. Prisoner Hahn was sentenced to seven years' penal servitude.

Muller and Hahn were arrested with Anton Kuepferle, who committed suicide in Brixton Prison, London. All three were accused of sending military information to Germany by means of invisible ink. Kuepferle, who once lived in Brooklyn, claimed American citizenship, and Muller professed to be a naturalized Englishman. Hahn admitted he was a German subject.


