LACK OF FAITH IS CAUSE OF TROUBLES
Successful Churches Built On Prayer and Faith, Declares Rev. John Garbutt.

"Lack of faith and confidence between the nations is the cause of the world's troubles today, and lack of faith and confidence in the business world is the cause of business depression," declared Rev. John Garbutt, the new pastor of Dundas Centre Methodist Church in his Sunday evening service on "Faith and Its Results."
"Churches built on prayer and faith will succeed," said Mr. Garbutt beginning his sermon. "God cannot be dealt with as you deal with mathematics. You cannot deal with God as you deal with a man. God is not a man. Faith is the method by which man comes into relationship with God."
Science and philosophy no longer deny the existence of God, said Mr. Garbutt, declaring that Bradshaw, Voltaire and Ingalls who were popular writers a generation or two ago, were only names today.
In the course of his sermon, Mr. Garbutt referred to his meeting overseas with a Roman Catholic chaplain from British Columbia. This chaplain had been brought up an Anglican, but became dissatisfied with his faith, and spent six months going every Sunday morning to the Roman Catholic Church, and every Sunday evening to the Methodist Church in the city of Vancouver. Finally he decided to become a Roman Catholic. He need not have done so, said Mr. Garbutt. Faith would have brought him in direct communication with God, had his faith been strong enough.

NO BUSINESS WITH GOD WITHOUT TRUST
Dr. R. A. Carmine Says the Almighty Invites Partnership.

Taking as his text "We are Laborers Together With God," Rev. Dr. R. A. Carmine preached a forceful sermon on "Partnership" at the First Methodist Church Sunday morning. Dr. Carmine, who hails from Florida, seems to have quickly become popular among the members of his London congregation. "All civilized people," he stated, "must go into partnership with each other. They have no choice. No civilized man or woman can be independent. Only the savages are independent. The savage is independent wherever he is found, but just the reverse where he is civilized he must enter a partnership."
"Capitalists are awakening to the fact that capital must go into partnership with labor. The idea in the United States steel industry now is to get the workers to take shares in the industry. There is nothing so terrible to the I. W. W. as to a fellow like William H. Wood, who was sentenced to life and fined to Russia's profit-sharing."
"So the Almighty God has invited people to get into partnership with him. God Almighty asks everybody that he has redeemed to come into partnership with him."
"There is no business to be done without God and you unless there is trust."
Common law, he said, recognized four kinds of partnership, namely, secret partnership, dormant partnership, nominal partnership and ostensible partnership.
A secret partner did not want his name in the business for some reason, a dormant partner is not active, he only put his money into the business and drew his profits without working, while the nominal partner is a partner in name only. The ostensible partner is the one who counts, he works and puts his all into the business. That is the kind of a partner that God wants, Dr. Carmine remarked.
A partner, he declared, must first of all promise not to hurt the business. God had allowed him to enter on that basis because he loved him. "I am a tither," he announced. "If there were tithes many financial difficulties of the church would be solved," he added.
"When we enter into partnership with God we must give our hearts. This is a heart religion. Heart power must go into the business. It is as little as any one can do to put everything into the business," were his parting words.

LONDONER'S AUTO IS FOUND AT STRATFORD

Car Stolen Here Was Recovered by the Police.
STRATFORD, July 23.—An auto owned by J. Newman of 2 Cartwright street, London, has been recovered by the police. It was stolen in London a couple of days ago and Mr. Newman came to the city today to claim his car. A spare tube and two overcoats were missing.
Misses A. L. Campbell and E. W. Castle, public health nurses, arrived in the city today and will remain for six weeks. In a couple of weeks the nurses contemplate organizing a child's welfare clinic for children up to six years. In the meantime they will make a house-to-house visitation, particularly where there are children under two years of age and will advise mothers on the care and general nutrition of children.

UNITED STATES 'GOBS' REV. CHAS. DURRANT PASS THROUGH CITY IS NEW PRESIDENT OF SUMMER SCHOOL

London Layman Has Been Booked by Executive For Next Year.
KINGSVILLE July 23.—Rev. Charles Durrant of Harrow was elected president of the Kingsville Summer School. The registration has gone up to 300. It is the largest and the oldest religious summer school in Canada. It has been held every year for twenty years on the farm at Kingsville and is the only institution which is granted this privilege. There are 40 sleeping tents in addition to the big meeting hall. These 300 young people are delegates from the Methodist Sunday schools and leagues of Kent and Essex Counties and are receiving training during the different departments of church work. Mr. Ainsworth the missionary from Japan has become the idol of the school. His classes have attracted a large number, and he has captured the leading teams in the general sports.
Mr. Liddicoat of London has made such a hit that already the executive has booked him for next year. He is the only layman on the program, but he has given the school a most scholarly exposition on the life of St. Paul. There is a great spirit of comradeship pervading the school, and military discipline prevails.
"Religion and Recreation" was the theme of Rev. John Coburn's address this afternoon, and he insisted that the church must not stand aloof, offering a stirring appeal by Rev. Mr. Johnston of Essex.
Arthur Simonds of Detroit conducted a golf clinic from 4 to 7. The Japan class came out first in four events out of five and was presented with the pennant for the best average. The Walkerville boys won the medal in the 200-yard relay race. About 500 people sat down to tea, and so completely and completely had Mr. Simonds organized the picnic that lunch was over in fifteen minutes, and without a jar, the whole crowd moved over to the pavilion for evening prayers and listened to a stirring appeal by Rev. Mr. Johnston of Essex.

MAY RUSH WORK ON NEW HOTEL

Additional Land For Golf Links Is Now Being Sought.

ST. THOMAS, July 24.—The promoters of the hotel to be erected on the Invererie Heights, are negotiating for the purchase of the rolling land north of the old Lake road and immediately in rear of the proposed location of summer resort on the Fraser Heights for a small golf links. The unsold area on the old Fraser House site running from the top of the north ravine to the brow of the hill has been selected for the building and it will be so placed as to command a view of the lake from Port Talbot to Port Bruce and the lovely landscape for miles to the north of the heights.
There will be sufficient land left for a series of bowling greens and lawn tennis courts. A number of local capitalists have faith enough in the success of the venture to take a substantial share of the stock issue, and it is stated that Sir Adam Beck gives every encouragement to the proposed summer hostelry.
According to a local contractor, the comparatively substantial reduction in the prices of the material to be used in the structure would allow for its immediate erection at a figure well within the proposed cost of the building. It would be three stories in height and have a dance hall and assembly rooms on the uppermost floor.
Wandering in Windsor.
A couple of lads in their teens, Albert Kay and Willie Thibener, giving their home town, St. Thomas, as their last place of residence, were found wandering in Windsor last evening and were locked up. The youths are held on no specific charge. Their parents in St. Thomas have been instructed to call for them.
Attendance Reached 100.
The attendance at the Presbyterian summer school at Alma College has reached 100, and the interest in the daily and evening exercises have been well maintained from the hour of the opening services. A trip was made to the lake yesterday by the collegians, and was immensely enjoyed.

RED PERIL USED BY MILITARISTS

Question of Land Disarming Now Turns On Russia, Not Germany.

Paris, July 24.—Unless some serious progress is made toward orderly relations with Russia during the next few months, any discussions at Washington about land armaments will be wasted. On this point, the writer believes course, France, anxious, and of Frenchmen and exiles, and of the conference respecting land forces, no matter what agreement the maritime powers may reach concerning navies. Moreover, Japan is hardly likely to consent to a land force reduction for the same reason.
German Menace Wanes.
The French premier, Briand, is convinced that the disarmament of Germany is proceeding satisfactorily, and does not intend to flout the German menace as a reason for maintaining a huge military establishment. But the Russian threat, or bogey, as some choose to call it, looms bigger than ever in his eye, and he will insist that France shall be ready to help whenever a buffer state, open to Bolshevik penetration, needs help, whether that state be in the Balkans, on the Baltic, or in the Near East.
Ever since Woodrow Wilson flung at France the faint of "militarism" more than a year ago, official France has been decidedly touchy on this question of land armaments. One reason for the soreness was that so many Frenchmen agreed with Mr. Wilson, thus fanning the anti-militarist flames and adding the internal "Bolshevik" peril that contributes to the justification for maintaining a big army.

Needs Army at Home.
The writer has it in so many words from a government spokesman that besides maintaining armies in the occupied German territory and in mandated regions, France is obliged to keep a large force in the Paris district as a precaution against domestic troubles. Yet Germany's need for a similar pretorian guard was pooh-poohed as a masked military manoeuvre.
This merely illustrates how little fairness may be expected in a general disarmament discussion in which each nation will claim its own arms are for legitimate defence and the maintenance of law and order, whereas those of other nations are to be regarded as intended for unprovoked aggression.
Many persons here regard President Harding's move as a body blow to the League of Nations, and this comment will scarcely fall of justification if the league at this time steps aside on the question of disarmament.
By a coincidence the disarmament committee of the league is meeting here, and the French delegates, headed by Rene Viviani, the chairman, have declared they will ask the committee to postpone its activities, pending the result of the Harding conference. If the French suggestion is adopted, the committee will have to go before the league assembly in October and confess that it refrained from attempting anything

League Has Rival.
The representatives of minor nations here do not make a secret of their opposition of such a course, since they have worked ardently in the hope of accomplishing something through the league, and do not fancy leaving matters to the Washington conference, to which they were not invited.
The importance of their attitude may be realized when it is stated that, according to an American military observer now in Europe, and who visited the countries in question, there are many good army organizations among the small new states. He cited the Serbians as the best army in Europe today. The Czech, Rumanian and Polish armies are all much larger than America's, and are well equipped.
Premier Briand of France and Prime Minister Lloyd George of Great Britain, both anxious to attend the Washington conference, may be deterred by the league, if one goes, however, both will go. That much seems certain.
French critics believe that better results could be obtained at the conference by trained diplomats than by the laymen, who would constantly be talking for home consumption, and to further their own political ends. It is feared that the two premiers would be

constantly out-doing or out-staying each other for newspaper publicity, and would be trying always to score points rather than reach an agreement.
However, granted the high question is disposed of, or quieted temporarily by Lloyd George, despite the opposition of the Northcliffe press, which says his reputation in America is tarnished probably will go to Washington. The Briand will be obliged to follow.
But naval supremacy interests continental Europe little. There is no considerable naval power on the continent with Germany's disarmament. As it is, the vacant chair will cast the deciding ballot.
