New York, Aug. 30.—Where has the waistline gone? Few can say but at any rate it has disappeared from its usual haunts, so far as the designs of many of the new dresses are concerned. Girdles and belts seem to have taken a vacation likewise. The new designs for fall start from the neckline with the general tubular outline of a \$4 fountain pen, ornamented with alleged gold filigree and it is not until the knees are reached that the gown commences to give way, to what the Greenwich villager alludes to longingly as "self-expression."

At that point many of the gowns gain a full ripple effect by the insertion of pointed godets, by means of circular gores or by flounce. In the majority of the samples, the waistline is attained without the loss of the long flat lines of the tubular silhouette in front and back. One striking design, however, seemingly owes its inspiration to a champagne glass turned upside down as it should be in law-abiding America. The frock from shoulders to knees follows the lines of the slender stem, but from knee to hem, it flattens out like the wide shallow bowl of the container of laughing bubbles.

Waistline Vogue.
In cases where the waistline is impossible to determine, the place of girdle of belt is often taken by a band of heavy embroidery. In still other designs, there is merely a spray of blossoms on an embroidered medallion posed at the hip. A delightful frock of this sort has just been supplied by a leading designer for a prominent American woman. The gown is of flesh colored georgette, made without waistline, but

draped into long graceful lines by being caught by a bow of lace at the left hip. Pale honey-colored lace forms the neckline and the tight sleeves and continues to fall from the under side of the sleeve to the hipline in graceful wings. This trimming is employed also in flowing draperies at either side of the skirt.

Shops are swarming today with school and college girls shopping preparatory to the beginning of the academy year. Those parents who still preserve influences with their offspring, however, are confining these purchases to the more staple articles of attire. Until the latest fall has its chance to appear at the autumn football games, few parents know what their daughters will wear or want. They may see them attired in Alaskan mukluks, a Tibetan grass skirt, and two-gallon cowboy hat, so far as they know at present.

Three-Piece Suit.
There is every evidence, however, that the three-piece suit will hold equal popularity among the younger elements, as well as with those of more mature years. On these, also, the belt is conspicuous by its absence. Many of the most swagger are of Scotch or Irish homespun, with coats double breasted, fastened with four buttons and ending just above the knee. Pocket will and charmuse vie with the satins in popularity among the dress materials.

The cloth topsuits which will form part of the contents of the wardrobe trunks, unloaded at the college towns this fall seem to have borrowed their designs and their colors from the tent and awning trade stripes. Bands and diagonals of vivid color run up, down, and around these garments, which are usually finished with a fur collar of the bolter type.
