

RUHR SURRENDER

British Cabinet May Hear Result of Premier's Conversation.

PAPERS PERTURBED

Associated Press Despatch. London, Sept. 26.—Germany's unconditional surrender in the Ruhr invests tiday's meeting of the British cabinet with additional importance. It is the first cabinet council in several weeks during which time events of great moment directly affecting British interests have happened. The deliberations, of course, are secret, as usual, and no official report of them is to be expected. It is taken for granted that the foremost subject of the discussion will be foreign affairs, and that before the close Minister Baldwin of his much-discussed conversation with Premier Poincare. It in not supposed, however, that the cabinet members will be called upon to decide any important point of policy, in view of the present uncertainty in the situation ail around.

Editorial comment on the surrender

of Germany is very limited. The Dally Mail, staunch supporter of France, raises a paean of triumph and praise for Premier Poincare, but the newspapers which so severely condemned his policy

are mostly silent. The Morning Chronicle, however, harshly scores France and the present British government for causing in Germany "a financial collapse of appalling magnitude," and adds: "The economic ruin of Germany is a deadly blow to British trade and to the British ideas of reconstruction. . . . It is rather a bad day for England and English

Some of the newspapers are greatly perturbed as to how Great Britain will are in reparations in view of Germany's present position. The Times more than doubts whether the payment of repara-tions to any of the Allies appears more than probable as a result of the French success in the Ruhr.
