### HONEY REPORT CLAIMED UTTERLY RIDICULOUS

Surplus Available For Export  
500,000 Pounds, Not 6,000,000, Says Official.

Toronto, Aug. 18.—Characterizing as "utterly ridiculous" the statement of C. B. Gooderham, Dominion apiarist, that the Canadian honey crop this year would show an exportable surplus of 6,000,000 pounds, A. G. Hal-

stead, general manager of the Ontario Honey Producers' Association, of Toronto, with which is associated the great bulk of the honey producers of the country, stated today that as a result of careful investigation of the honey situation throughout the country, he was convinced that the surplus available for export would not amount to more than 500,000 pounds.

There is a fifty per cent crop only in Ontario, according to Mr. Halstead, 60 in Quebec and a very uncertain crop in Manitoba.

### GRIM, ANCIENT CONVICT SHIP NOW SAILING ON LAKE HURON

Thousands at Sarnia See Vessel Reclaimed From Sydney Harbor.

GOES TO BAY CITY

Peculiar Features Tell Story of Horror of Early Days.

Sarnia, Aug. 18.—Gently propelled up the St. Clair River into Lake Huron by a southerly breeze, the old British convict ship, Success, strangest and most infamous of all ships afloat, late tonight nosed her way towards Bay City, Michigan, after being on exhibition here a week, during which several thousand people from Sarnia and Port Huron visited the vessel.

The ship is privately owned, and since being salvaged from Sydney harbor, Australia, some years ago, has circled the globe.

The outside view of the old ship gives only the faintest idea of her interest. Painted a drab yellow with the British broadsword lining her side, a hundred questions are suggested by the square antiquated stern, the woman figure head, the ship's solid teak sides, her rigging and the glimpses of some of the exhibits.

A sign in the rigging announced some of the points of interest, air-dried cells, the coffin bath, the flogging frames, the cat o' nine tails, punishment balls, branding irons, black holes, cells for the condemned. The lower deck of the vessel is below the water line and it was on this deck that solitary confinement prisoners were held in the old days when England exiled her worst criminals. The black hole is the smallest cell on the ship, and it is the narrowest. In its confines where adults can neither sit, stand or lie, prisoners were kept for as long as twenty-eight days.

The condemned cells are at the other extreme end of the lower deck. It was in these dark cells, heavily chained, that prisoners who had been condemned to be hanged at the yard-arm were permitted a few hours before execution. These cells are a little larger than the black holes, but this was necessary because it sometimes happened that three or even four unfortunates had to occupy the cell at the same time.

In the cells there are wax figures, representing long dead unfortunates who occupied them. Nowadays the Success is lit by electricity, but that only seemed to accentuate the grimness of the sights which the decks afforded viewers.

The Success soon leaves for Australia and the St. Clair River is unlikely to again see this striking illustration of a barbaric system.

### CASUALTIES HEAVY IN MOROCCAN WAR

Rebellious Tribesmen Carrying Out Guerilla Warfare On Both Fronts.

Associated Press Despatch. Madrid, Aug. 18.—Guerilla warfare is being carried out by the rebellious Moroccan tribesmen on both the eastern and western fronts of the Spanish zone, according to an official statement given out today. Sanguinary hand-to-hand fighting, with heavy losses on both sides, is reported at Wadiah. The Spanish losses are given as four officers and fifteen soldiers killed, and two officers and fifty men wounded. The rebel casualties are said to be considerable.

A Spanish column operating on the left," says the statement, "has reached Afra and cleared the surrounding villages of rebels, meeting only with slight enemy fire. The enemy is believed to have suffered heavily, as 72 bodies were found at the foot of Moravite Hill.

Another column which escorted a convoy to reinforce Taza continued to march to Chentafa, which is still besieged by the enemy in great numbers.

### MONSTER PARADE FEATURES REUNION

Seven Hundred Watford Old Boys Register For Celebration.

Special to The Advertiser. Watford, Aug. 18.—Beautiful weather features the opening day of the Watford old boys' reunion. The morning was given over to the registration of old boy visitors, and upwards of 700 have already registered. Promptly at 1:30 p.m. the parade, which marked the official opening of the fun-making, started from the railway bridge and proceeded by way of main street and Simcoe street to the Exhibition Park. The feature of today's parade was the splendid procession of school children led by the boys' bugle and kazoo band, while cowboys on horseback, clowns, decorated cars and floats were other features.

The stores were all closed for the afternoon, and a general holiday observed throughout the village, while crowds came in from the surrounding country to help celebrate Watford's semi-centennial. At the Exhibition Park John Farrell, immigration officer of London, acted as chairman, and the official address of welcome was delivered by the reeve, W. G. Connelly, B.A. Another address was given by B. W. Fansher, M.P. for East Lambton; L. W. Oke, M.L.A. for East Lambton; Leslie Harkness, warden of Lambton county; J. E. Armstrong, ex-M.P.; W. R. Dawson of Inwood and W. S. Calvert of Strathroy, former Liberal whip in the Dominion parliament. Mr. Calvert, as a Watford old boy, replied to the address of welcome.

Two Watford boys, R. D. Swift and Clarence L. Cook, composers of the official song of the reunion, "Hello, You," were introduced to the audience and gave a fine rendering of their song, with R. D. Swift, writer of the words, as soloist, and C. L. Cook, composer of the music, at the piano. Kelly's Clown Comedians and Fred Morrison, comedian, supplied the laughs for the program, while Scotch dances were given by the Munro Kilie Dancing Girls. Following the evening performance a fine display of fireworks was given.

At 10:30 p.m. a community dance was held on the pavement on Main street and continued until early morning.

Telegrams of greeting were received at the afternoon session from several Watford old boys, including "Dad" Williams of Vancouver, Arthur C. Williamson of Trail, B. C., and Kate C. McDonald of Toronto.

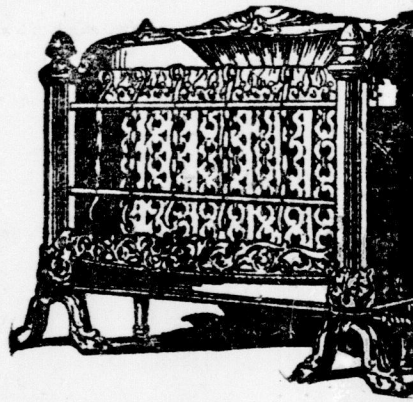
