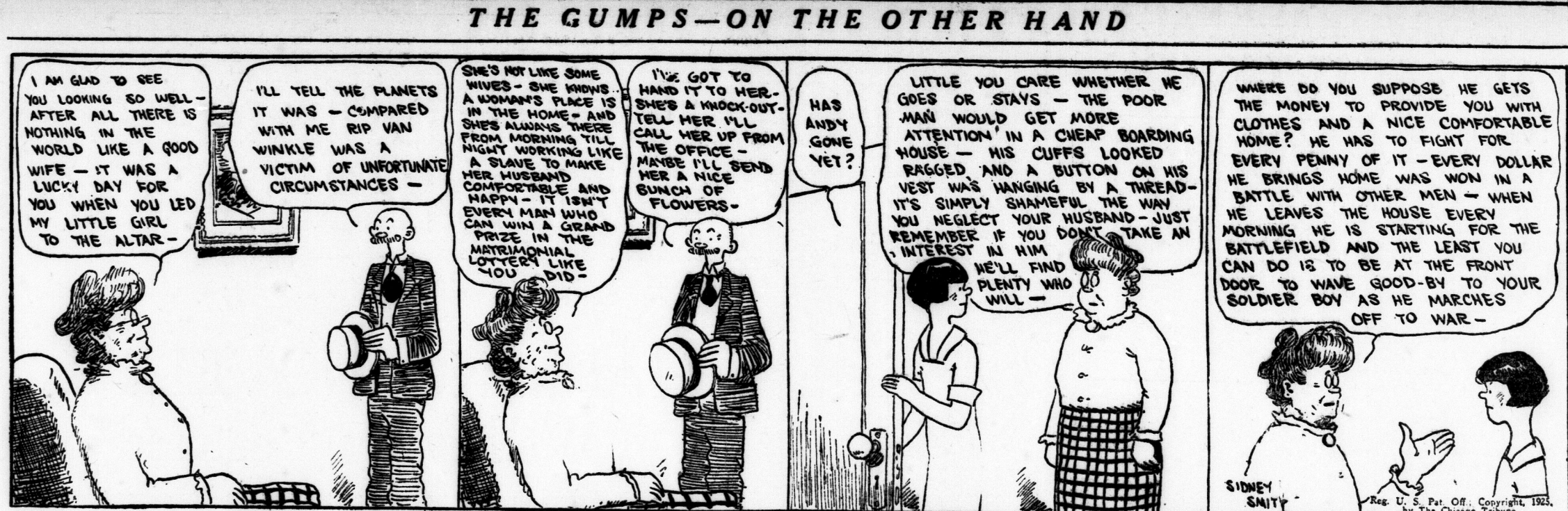

French Blow Up Blockhouse Rather Than Become Captives

Fifteen Auto Loads Leave Sarnia On Association's Annual Trip.

Associated Press Despatch. Paris, June 22.—A despatch to the Intransigent from Fez, French Morocco, says that Second Lieutenant Lapeyre, with six Senegalese soldiers, the only survivors of his original garrison of 27 men, blew up their blockhouse on the Franco-Moroccan front on June 14 rather than be taken alive or surrender to the besieging Rifians of Abd-el-Krim's forces.

Later the upturned canoe was found. They were all about 17 years of age.
