"There is no slush fund behind my campaign," stated Mayor Sloggett. The remark came as a result of the statement made by Mitchell Hepburn to the effect that the slush fund was the greatest evil electors had to contend with in politics today. Mr. Sloggett asserted that there are no strings attached to his election campaign, and if he is elected he will be free to state himself as he chooses. "I would not run on such a policy," stated the candidate.

## MALCOLM BACKS

## CANADIAN LABOR

N. Bruce Liberal Candidates Views Win Approval at Wiarton.

Warton, Oct. 16.—Despite a heavy rain the hall here tonight was filled and it was necessary to bring in extra chairs for the meeting held on behalf of James Malcolm, Liberal candidate for North Bruce.

Mr. Malcolm was given a most hearty reception, and his remarks were frequently punctuated by the applause of the audience.

The outstanding feature of the address by the candidate was his answer to statements made by Col. Hugh Clarke, Conservative candidate, regarding a speech made by Mr. Malcolm in Goderich in 1923. Mr. Clarke had taken exception to the address, which was made before the Lions club, and from the platform in the riding had endeavored to show that Mr. Malcolm was opposed to fair labor conditions and wanted immigration of cheap labor.

Tonight Mr. Malcolm gave his audience more of the content of his Goderich address, and showed that he had said that the average worker in Ontario was not a pick and shovel man, but that he properly developed the industrial life of the province and Dominion it was necessary to have men to do these heavier and more menial jobs, and he favored sufficient immigration of the cheaper labor to meet these conditions, but not to come into active competition with Canadian labor.

When the position was explained the audience applauded Mr. Malcolm, and proved that they agreed with his position as being fair and square for Canadian labor.

Other speakers were Mr. Coomes of Kincardine and Mr. Moore of Wiarton. President James Simons of the local Liberal association, presided. Music was furnished by the Cape Croker Indian band, and several voices were rendered by Messrs. Brown, Pilkington and Anderson.

## CHATHAM HAS 12TH MYSTERIOUS BLAZE

Fire Damages Barn at Rear of Grocery—Declared Incendiary.

Chatham, Oct. 16.—Fire damaged a small barn at the rear of Dyer's grocery, Emma street, late last night. The flames were controlled before the property became involved.

## TO DETERMINE AN INQUEST

Wealthy Ford Resident Found Dead From Poisoning.

Windsor, Oct. 16.—Crown Attorney James S. Allan has yet to determine if an inquest will be held in the death of William Tuer, wealthy 70-year-old recluse, found dead of poisoning at his home, 268 Hickory street, Ford, late Thursday.

The police say they believe he ended his life rather than face trial this week at the fall session of the supreme court of Ontario at Sandwich. He had been free on bail of £2,000 following a serious charge filed against him in parents of a 14-year-old girl at Ford.

## FALLS INTO SULPHURIC ACID, WORKMAN DIES OF BURNS

Windsor, Oct. 16.—Falling into a vat of sulphuric acid while at work this morning in the Ford Motor Company's plant at Ford City, A. Korman was so severely burned that he died this afternoon in Hotel Dieu. Korman was standing beside the vat when in some unknown manner he fell into the acid. Ford authorities are investigating the accident. An inquest will likely be called by Dr. P. J. G. Mercier, coroner of Ford City, who ordered the remains be placed in Janisse's morgue. Korman was a married man living at 1257 Hickory street, Ford City. He was 37 years old.

## Locarno Cheers Statesmen As Protocol Is Concluded

Locarno, Oct. 16.—Europe's great security conference ended tonight in a victory for peace. At exactly 7:29 the European statesmen who made this victory possible, threw open a window on the second floor of the Palace of Justice and, rejecting decorum, announced to the waiting multitude that the Rhine pact and other treaties had been formally approved by the plenipotentiaries.

When the British foreign secretary, Austen Chamberlain, came and waved his hand, the crowd clamored for a speech. Chancellor Luther and the German foreign minister, Dr. Stresemann, were acclaimed with no less fervor than their colleagues, succeeded in his mission.

Instantly the crowd gave vent to enthusiastic shouts, and a cheer went into the air, their balls of fire narrowly missing falling on the delegates. The appearance at the window of M.
