 burning, and when several hours later
 the employes of the hotel were attracted
 by the odor of escaping gas, they entered
 the room and found Mrs. Cowan uncon-
 conscious. When the doors and windows
 were opened the woman quickly recovered,
 but the physicians who had been sum-
 moned stated that she had a very narrow
 escape.

 Mayor Spencer and Aldermen Jeffrey
 Garsshore and Dreaux left by the St.
 Thomas express yesterday afternoon for
 Montreal to talk over the London & Port
 Stanley Railway with G. T. R. Manager
 Seagraves.

Rev. W. Patterson, of Cook's Church,
 Toronto, will speak in St. Andrew's
 Church on Tuesday night, and preach in
 St. James Church on Wednesday, Thurs-
 day and Friday nights.
 E. E. Rice's latest production, "Evan-
 gelism," comes to the Grand Opera House
 to-night. It will receive the same lavish
 production and will be presented by the
 same excellent company that has charac-
 terized its engagements in the large West-
 ern and Eastern cities this season.
 Mr. James De Wolfe, machinist, at
 Wortman & Ward's foundry, York street,
 while at the top of the steps in front of
 the building on Wednesday last, slipped
 and fell to the ground, a distance of twenty
 feet. He was painfully cut and bruised,
 and his escape from more serious injury
 was miraculous.

 elected secretary and treasurer.
 "The Fire Patrol," which will be pre-
 sented at the Grand on Wednesday next,
 is said to abound in realistic and thrilling
 situations, and to have made a success.
 In the play there is a fire patrol wagon,
 and a view is given of the interior of the
 Homestead stamp mill, at Deadwood,
 South Dakota, with the big ore-crushers
 in actual operation. The plot is said to
 be interesting and the scenery excellent.
 A large and influential committee,
 consisting of representatives from the
 Ministerial Association, the Women's
 Christian Temperance Union, with others,
 met in the Y. M. C. A. rooms yesterday
 to discuss the early closing movement.
 Reports were given of the results of the
 canvass of large employers of labor as to
 their willingness to uniformly have some
 other day rather than Saturday for pay-
 ment of wages. It was found that many
 all others were quite favorable to it.
 Only one seemed to be against it.
 After considering all phases of the ques-
 tion it was decided to appoint committees
 to interview all the grocery business and
 all in the dry goods business as to their
 willingness to close their places of busi-
 ness at not later than nine on Saturday eve-
 nings. For the former, Ald. Moulie, and
 Messrs. A. McCormick, T. A. Rowat, A.
 J. Wall, John Lawson and W. H. Fergu-
 son were requested to act, and for the
 latter the following ladies:—Mesdames
 Carfrae, Roger, Whitehead, Hopkins,
 Gibson, Fraser, Ward, Puddle, Fysh,
 Genze, McFaggart, Ingram, Firth. All
 the ministers of the city have been and are
 requested to address their congregations in
 favor of the movement.—Cos.

AS IT IS IN EAST ELGIN.

HE CLAIMS LONDON AS HIS HOME.
 Mr. Gibbons said the trade of the coun-
 try had not grown since 1870. I wonder
 where he lives? I wonder what he reads?
 When the Liberals went out of power the
 commerce of the country had fallen sixty-
 five millions of dollars, and Sir Richard
 had pocketed after deficit, and borrowed
 money at ruinous rates. The trade
 returns, Mr. Gibbons to the contrary, said
 the commerce of the country had gone up
 to \$220,000,000. Trade returns for six
 months of the present fiscal year showed
 that we had exported over \$72,000,000 in
 goods, as compared with \$98,000,000 for
 the whole of the previous year.
 (Cheers.) The additional cost to the
 people for all the luxuries they now had
 was only eleven cents more per head than
 they paid ten years ago. (Applause.) It
 follows from the question of the market, the
 hon. gentleman showed that geographical
 nearness was not a point to be considered.
 We wanted someone to buy from
 us who did not raise what we raised.
 The elements of a market were supply and
 demand. It was in the British market that
 Canada would find a continual demand.
 Jan. Mr. Foster pointed out in forcible
 terms the fallacies of the free trade argu-
 ments, showing that what they
 advocated was not free trade at all, but
 simply a union with a country which had
 a much higher tariff wall, shutting out the
 rest of the world. And from the United
 States we would have to buy everything
 almost, and at much greater prices than they
 could be purchased elsewhere. He in-
 stanced cottons and woollens, concluding,
 the Finance Minister told of Dr. Wilson's
 escape from the House when the resolu-
 tion of loyalty to the Queen was moved,
 and asked the electors of East Elgin to send
 to Ottawa a man who would not be the
 proud—Mr. A. B. Ingram. (Great cheer.)

The meeting broke up with the usual
 loud and hearty cheers.
 The first case of diphtheria in Woodstock
 in two years was reported Thursday night
 from Mill street. The disease was brought
 there by Mrs. E. K. Meyer, of Ebel, who has
 been on a visit to friends in Tavistock.
 She came to Woodstock Thursday on a
 visit to relatives in the West End, and her
 child feeling unwell, Dr. McLaugh was
 called in, who pronounced the disease dipht-
 heria.
 A young son of Mr. John Grutsch, of
 Stratford, had an experience Thursday
 night nearly cost him his life. He was
 standing near the track as the noon train
 going west was passing, and in his im-
 pulse to cross stepped too near the rail.
 He says he felt a sensation of dizz-
 ness, unconsciously leaped over and
 was struck by a passing car. He was
 lifted clear off the ground and hurled
 several feet from the track. He was badly
 injured when he fell, and when
 taken home had all the appearance of a
 badly used up boy.

There died at Stratford, on Thursday
 morning, Mr. Salsbury, an old and well-
 known resident of that town. He went to
 Adolphus when but eleven years old. After
 a prolonged residence in Adolphus he
 moved to Lobb, where he made himself
 owner of one of the choice farms of that
 excellent township. Wishing to retire
 from active life of the farm, Mr. Sals-
 bury moved to Stratford, to a residence
 on Quality Hill. He soon endeared him-
 self to the people of the town, and was
 generally well known. In the county he
 showed marked ability, and was appointed
 Road Commissioner, which office he
 filled with credit to himself and benefit to
 the town.

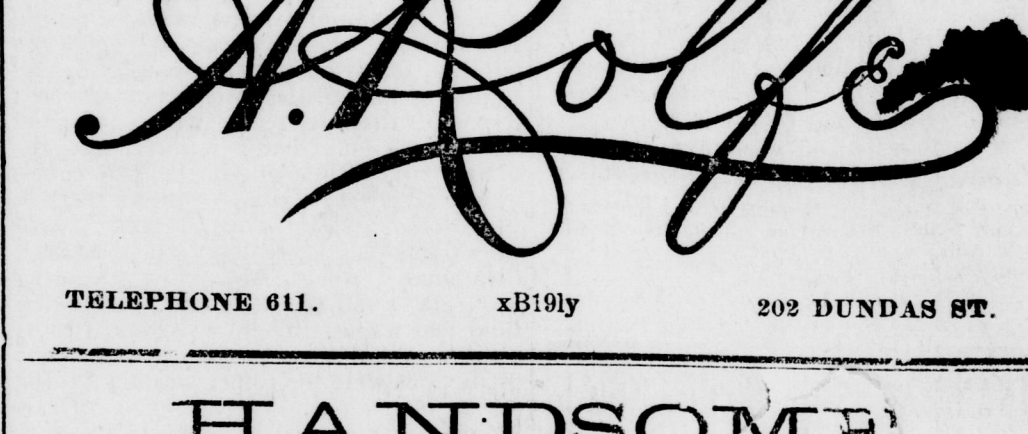
