CHARGE INHUMANITY.

Documents have been received from Glasgow, Scotland, by J. M. Hearn, K. C., of Sydney, N. S., alleging inhuman treatment of seven seamen by Capt. Marthle of the steamer Boveric, which left that port last June for Seattle with a cargo of rails and is now on the Sound. It is stated that the seamen were imprisoned while the ship was at Sydney for alleged breach of discipline, and action was brought by Mr. Hearn for false imprisonment, and the captain held to buil for \$4,000. The men were placed aboard the steamer on the ave of her departure, and according to the documents referred to, were put into separate confined places, and handcuffed till they arrived in St. Lucia, on June 8, a period of nine days, during which time the treatment of the men is described as inhuman. The men were placed on shore at St. Lucia, and thence to Southampton via Barbadoes, arriving at Greenock on July 16. Proceedings have been taken against the owners of the ship by the men and the board of trade.
