SUMMARY EXECUTION

Government of Hayti Causes Five Men Conspiracy

Washington, Nov. 13 .- Private advices from responsible foreign sources in Hayti give details of the execution of five political prisoners recently reported in a despatch from Minister Furniss to the State Department.

According to these advices, some weeks ago several men were arrested and condemned to death on the charge of conspiring against the government.
