MEETING OF BOARD OF TRADE

Bridge Matter Advanced Another Step—Imperial Oil Matter Up Again.

A meeting of the Board of Trade was held in the Firemen's Hall last Friday evening. In the absence of the President, the Vice-President, Mr. Geo. G. McKenzie presided.

Mr. D. A. Stewart, one of the delegates which went to Ottawa to further the bridge matter reported that they had interviewed the Minister of Public Works and with Hon. Mr. Wigmore, pressed strongly for an appropriation for the construction of the bridge this year.

They had been given every assurance that the matter would be dealt with at an early meeting of the government when the chairman of the delegation would be notified of their decision.

A telegram enquiring if the matter had been dealt with had been forwarded and the reply received that the matter had not been taken up.

Mr. Stewart also reported that while in Montreal he had interviewed the C. N. R. management in reference to the suburban train service to Campbellton from the east and had been led to understand that nothing could be done.

Considerable discussion took place on this question. It was felt that the railway management should provide some service to enable people to arrive at Campbellton during the day. The suggestion was made that even a passenger car on the fast freight would be an accommodation to any having business here.

This matter was left in the hands of the Transportation Committee and Mr. Stewart.

The matter of the Imperial Oil Co. plant here was discussed. A letter was read from the provincial manager stating that it was up to the citizens to say whether they wanted this at Campbellton or not. They were not disposed to thrust it upon the town if it was not wanted.

It was the unanimous opinion of all present that every effort should be taken to clear the way for the establishment of this important plant here and a committee composed of Messrs. John Harquail, W. S. Richards, John C. Maclean, Geo. G. McKenzie and H. B. Anslow was appointed to go fully into the matter and take all steps necessary to bring the matter to a successful issue.

The committee to investigate the Town Manager plan were given an extension of time to report.

The meeting then adjourned.

HORSE RACES AT DALHOUSIE

Races on the Ice Drew Large Crowds—Good Races, Fine Weather.

Dalhousie, N. B., April 5th.—Before a large crowd assembled for a horse race, the annual races were held here on Monday under splendid weather conditions. The ice was in perfect condition and people came from all parts of the county and Quebec side to take part in this annual event. Owing to the uncertainty of the weather for the last two weeks it was difficult to fix a definite date, and when the ice looked favorable last Thursday notices were immediately got out, with the result that a larger crowd attended than was expected. Full credit is due to the committee in charge, composed of Fred LeCouteur, J. W. Cooke and Wendall Harquail assisted by Charles Cabot, for the splendid manner in which everything was conducted. Below is a summary of the races:—

Free for All—1st prize won by "Lady Kerr" owned by Henry Good and driven by Albert Godin. Henry surely has a good horse in "Lady Kerr." She was ably handled by Albert Godin who is only fourteen years old and weighs 98 pounds. Lady Kerr's time was 2:12. 2nd prize won by "King Brazilian" owned by D. A. Stewart Campbellton and driven by Henry Cormier. Mr. Stewart's horse made a splendid showing. 3rd prize won by "Queen Beare" owned by Andrew Barberie and driven by Jack Kerr. With a little more training Mr. Barberie's horse should develop considerable speed.

Three Minute Race—1st prize won by "Frederick Wilks" owned by J. W. Cooke and driven by himself. Mr. Cooke has a good horse and his speed exceeded the expectations of the crowd. 2nd prize won by "Long Tom" owned by Harry Doyle of Campbellton and driven by himself.

Farmers' Race—1st prize won by C. Miller, 2nd prize by I. Normand, 3rd prize by Lewis Bujold. Mr. James E. Stewart of Dalhousie, John McEwen of Eel River and Mr. N. McMillan of Black Point were the judges.
