Such a failure of justice on the part of a public functionary in a sister province of the Confederation, with the evident object of protecting a criminal residing in that province, without the authorities seeming to pay the slightest attention to it, is extremely regretable, and will result in rendering the ad-ministration of justice between the two prov-inces almost impossible.
