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

Within sight of the station at Ather-stone, on the London and Northwestern Railway, there is to be seen an enor-mouse earthen ware jug, the largest in the world. This capacious article was manufactured at the Potteries, Church Gresley, over fifty years ago. Its hold-ing capacity, when full, is 150 quarts, and it is so large that a man can sit inside it. It now rests over the front door of a china, glass and earthenware warehouse. Many curious jugs and pitchers, the property of bellringers, are found in several parishes. one is pre-served at Hadleigh, in Suffolk, which is of brown glazed earthenware, hold sixteen quarts, and bears this insorip-tion:


