Winnipeg, Dec. 23.—As anticipated in last night's despatches, the Provincial Legislature was dissolved to-day, and Jan. 15 is fixed as the date of a general election. The new Legislature will meet for the despatch of business on Jan. 24. The school question will, of course, be the paramount issue in the campaign, but in the rural constituencies many side issues will be intro-
