Another of Inspector Maxwell's recommendations to the Minister of Education has become law. In the Statute Law Amendment Act of 1917, there have been added to Section 15 of the Public Schools' Act of 1914 the following subsections: (6) The council of a county at the request of a majority of the councils of the townships in the county for a readjustment of the boundaries of the school sections in the townships of the county shall appoint arbitrators at the request of section 21. (7) The abitators shall take action and make their award and the same may be put into effect notwithstanding any time limit that may not have expired in connection with the operation of previous awards or changes of boundries. (8) the council of a county may, in like manner, appoint arbitrators the request of the council of any township in the county to readjust the boundaries of the school sections in the township. The change in the law will greatly facilitate needed readjustments in a county.
