FARM PARENTS AND
CONSOLIDATED SCHOOLS.

(By Mrs. D. E. Cooper in N. E. Home-
stead.)

Admitting that the consolidated
school stands for progress, I urge farm
parents to think twice before voting
for them for their younger children.
While the children are small give
them the advantage (for it is an ad-
vantage) of having the individual at-
tention and direct oversight that the
district school teacher can give them.
A young child at the district school
often sits with an older brother or
sister and is under their supervision
all day. This falling, there are school-
rooms on three sides of the schoolhouse
and the teacher usually sees all that
occurs on the school ground.

Of great importance is the drive to
be taken twice to and from the town-
ship school. The man who drives must
have the following qualifications: He
must be sober, of excellent moral char-
acter, possess a good team, be a fast
skilled, but very careful driver and of
good disciplinary, so that nothing
objectionable may be said or done by
the pupils during the drive.

Concerning that men could be found
possessing all these qualities, how
many, think you, are looking for such
employment? No, men of that type
are usually employed in some more
lucrative business.

One mother, herself a teacher before
her marriage, now the wife of a pros-
perous farmer, in asking to have her
children admitted to the village school
instead of the graded school to which
they had access, gave as her reason,
that the children were not under the
observation of the teacher, and that
they learned on the playground things
that were unsafe for young children to
learn. And what parent has not been
shocked by the almost unbelievable im-
morality that has cropped out in some
of the crowded schools?

It will be argued that children should
not always be shut out from evil. So,
say, this is true, but before their
characters are formed and while they
are susceptible to outside influen-
ces, the benefit of the purity that
the district school offers.

In a certain Illinois neighborhood
there were applications from more than
one town for the children to be admit-
ted to the district schools. Sometimes
it was because of the teaching, but
more often because of the teacher,
the individual attention given to each
pupil, and the playground associations.

A most injurious habit, common e-

ting with one leg swung over the

VICTORIA, B. C., Feb. 24.—If the
report brought here proves correct
Vancouver Island will see a stampede

days of the gold rush. On the beach
sands of Week Bay, at Sidney inlet,
which is on the west coast, a bank of
sand 100 feet high has been found,
and the yield varies from 843.26
to 2014.40 a ton. There are millions of
tons of raw material at Week Bay.
Immediately on being furnished with
the assay figures, Myles started out
and registered eight claims.

NORTHBORO, Mass., Feb. 21.—Thirteen
persons were hurt, three of them

a tree. It is supposed that he was
hurled through the glass of the vesti-
bule against the tree. He was remov-
ed to the office of Dr. Guntill, who

Nova Scotian A Successful Pastor

The dedication of the First Baptist
church, Dorchester, Mass., of which
Rev. A. V. Dimock, B. D., is pastor,
took place last week. The Dorchester
Bacon had the following:

"Rev. Arthur Vilroy Dimock, the
pastor of the church, is a young man
of deep spirituality and fine public
presence. He is a native of Halifax,
N. S. He is a direct descendant of the
family of Dimocks who played such an
important part in the early history of
that province. Prominent among them
was Shubal Dimock, who in the 18th
century was imprisoned for preaching
in Boston common, and after his re-
lease went to Falmouth, N. S., and it-
erated throughout the province as a
missionary, going from village to vil-
lage on horseback. For six genera-
tions the family has had a representa-
tive in the ministry, and the present
pastor of the First Baptist church is
of the sixth generation.

"He was educated in the schools of
Berwick and Halifax, N. S., and was
graduated B. A. from Acadia univer-
sity, Wolfville, N. S., in 1901. In 1906
he graduated from Newton Theologi-
cal seminary, taking the degree of
Bachelor of Divinity."

"He has had pastorates at Newport
and Paradise, Nova Scotia, and at the
First Baptist church, Winthrop, com-
ing here in May, 1904. He is married
and has two young sons. Mrs. Dimock
is a native of Nova Scotia, and is a
graduate of Acadia seminary."
